

POETRY OF THE IRISH CHARACTER.

A SWEDISH INN.

I put up at the Skjds House at Orebro, and I suppose it is in much the same state as in the days of Gustavus Vasa. It is built round in a court yard, in which horses, peasanis, carts, boys, dogs, and travellers, with a few pigs, and servant girls half undressed for heat, are scudding to and from the kitchen, are mingled in glorious confusion.

EFFECTS OF RAILWAY COMMUNICATION.

Formerly Scottish manufacturers for the London market were conveyed from Glasgow, Paisly, &c. by Canal to Edinburgh and Leith, whence they were carried by the steamers to the Thames. Since however, goods have been conveyed on the Railway from Liverpool to London, considerable quantities of the manufactures in question have been carried from Paisly, Glasgow, &c. by steam to Liverpool.

THE EMPEROR NICHOLAS AND A TRAIT OF DESPOTISM.

We were not long kept waiting: an inner door was thrown open and the Emperor entered, attended by the Governor-General, Count Orloff, General Alderberg, and half-a-dozen aides-de-camp. The boast of the Russians, that among a thousand men you would not fail to recognize the Emperor, is scarcely exaggerated. His figure is commanding and his countenance striking; his height must be nearly six feet two, and his frame unites symmetry with strength; his smile is peculiarly fascinating, but the high forehead, the short and curved upper lip, and the expression of a rather small mouth, impart somewhat of sternness to his features when in repose.

NEWSPAPER FOR THE BLIND.

A weekly newspaper for the blind was established at Palermo, in Sicily, on the 15th March last for the use of the blind. It is called "Il Consoletoire de Ciechi" literally, "The Consolator of the Blind."

ANECDOTE OF THE REVOLUTION.

At the celebration of the 4th that Hartford, the following toast was given. By the Hon. Joseph Trumbell. A Delegate in Congress from Connecticut, after having signed his name to the Declaration of Independence, said to one of his companions: "If we are defeated in our struggle for Independence, this day's work will make bad work for me. I have held a commission in the rebel army; I have written for the rebel newspapers; I am the son-in-law of a rebel Governor; and now I have affixed my name to this rebel Declaration."

The other gentleman answered: "I believe my case is not so desperate, for I have had no connection with the army; nor can it be proved that heretofore I have written, done any thing very obnoxious to the mother country. The immediate and prompt reply was: 'Then, sir you deserve to be hanged.'

NEW REAPING MACHINE.

We had an opportunity, yesterday, of seeing this machine in operation upon the Farm of the Hon. E. F. Chambers, and were much pleased with its performance; indeed we understand from all who have seen it at work, that it far surpasses all they had been prepared to expect from it. Judge Chambers has about 150 acres in wheat and rye, and the manner in which the fields so far have been cut down, is much superior to the ordinary mode of cradling, scarcely a straw being left standing. The machine keeps six binders hard at work, even with the stoppages that are incidentally required; we suppose it could give employment to several more without increasing the speed, which when we saw it, was a brisk walk, three mules being hitched to it. This machine, we understand is warranted to cut fifteen acres per day; at that rate it is more than equal to six cradles. Another thing which attracted our notice was the great regularity with which the straw and grain were laid for the binders, no raking with careful binders being required. Every person who has seen this machine in operation has been highly gratified with its performance; among others Judge T. B. Dorsey of Anne Arundel, and John Glenn, Esq. of Baltimore, who came over last week in the steamboat Wolcott for the express purpose of witnessing its operation. It is much superior in the quantity and quality of its work, to the cradle, as the latter is the old fashioned resting hook, and it answers equally well in light grain or rank.—Kent (Md.) Bugle
