A SWEDISH INN.

I put up at the Skyds House at Orebro and I suppose it is in much the same state as in the days of Gustavus Vass. It is built round in a court yard, in which horses, peasants, carts, boys, dogs, and travellers, with a few pigs, and servant girls half undressed for heat, and scudding to and from the kitchen, are mingled in glorious confusion. The bed room, however, which I got was much cleaner than I expected : but for dinner I was referred to another house, in which people keep food but not beds for travellers. Here you order a portion according to a carte, or lists of dishes, but in country towns the carte seldem tells of more than three sorts of dishes, of cept it be anise, brandy, or ale, which in general is very good, you must go to a third house, the kallare or town's cellar, where you may get wine. Should you want a desert, you must go to a fourth the conditor's or confectioner's, where you get coffee, and liquors. The Swede comes home at last to take his stesta, which all classes enjoy as regularly as in Spain or Italy, at the season. The laboring people regularly sleep in the shade for an hour or two; and the middle classes go to bed after dinner during the summer. - Laing's Travels in Sweden.

EFFECTS OF RAILWAY COMMUNI-CATION.

Formerly Scottish manufacturers for the London market were conveyed from Glasgow, Paisly, &c. by Canal to Elinburg and Leith, whence they were carried by the steamers to the Thames. Since bowever, goods have been conveyed on the Railway from Liverpool to London, considerable quantities of the manufactures in question have been carried from Paisly, Glascow, &c by steam to Liverpool. Thus, goods which left Gasgow on Friday, and reached the Clarence Dock wall on the following day, will be in London this morning. The conveyance is, we believe, not only quicker than the conveyance via Leith, but cheaper.

NEW REAPING MACHINE

We had an opportunity, yesterday, of seeing this machine in operation upon the Farm of the Hon. E. F. Chambers, and were much pleased with its performance; indeed we understand from all who have seen it at work, that it far surpasses all they had been prepared to expect from it. Judge Chambers has about 150 acres in wheat and rye, and the manner in which the fields so far have been cut down, is much superior to the ordinary mode of cradling, scarcely a straw being left standing. The machine keeps six binders hard at work, even with the stoppages that are incidentally required; we suppose it could give employment to several more without increasing the speed, which when we saw it, was a brisk walk, three mules being hitched to it. This machine, we understand is warranted to cut fifteen acres per day; at that rate it is more than equal to six cradles Another thing which attracted our notice was the great regularity with which the straw and grain were laid for the binders, no raking with careful binders being required .- Every person who has seen this machine in operation has been men you would not fail to recognize the among others Judge T.
