Pursuant to public notice, the Whig citizens of Davidson County, convened in the Court house on the 3d Inst., the Thursday of September 20th, 1839, to elect a new Board of Supervisors.

The object of the meeting was explained in a speech by the Chairman, and a resolution was passed to draft resolutions expressive of the sentiments of the meeting on the subjects of its deliberations.

Resolved, That this meeting approves the efforts now making to produce union and harmony in a Whig nomination for Governor, at the election in November next.

Resolved, That we believe that Henry Clay of Kentucky, is the only Whig candidate around whom the Whigs of this State can rally.

Resolved, That we believe him to be the most available candidate to successfully avert the dangers, resulting from the administration of the present Executive, and that we cordially recommend his nomination as President of these United States.

Resolved, That five Delegates be appointed by the Chairman of this meeting, to meet at Raleigh in November next, in Convention, to nominate a Governor.

Resolved, That the following Delegates be appointed by the Chair, viz: Alfred Hargrave, Dr. William R. Holt, Charles Brumwell, Doct. Charles L. Payne and John W. Thomas.
