[CIRCULAR.] DEPARTMENT OF STATE, March 10, 1841.

To the Hon. THOMAS EWING, Secretary of the Treasury:

Sir: The President is of opinion that it is a great abuse to bring the patronage of the General Government into conflict with the freedom of elections...

He therefore directs that information be given to all officers and agents in your Department of the public service that partisan interference in popular elections...

It is not intended that any officer shall be restrained in the free and proper expression and maintenance of his opinions respecting public men on public measures...

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State of North Carolina. By His Excellency, John M. Morehead, Governor, Captain General and Commander-in-Chief, in and over the State aforesaid.

WHEREAS, I have been duly informed by the Proclamation of His Excellency, WILLIAM HENRY HARRISON, President of the United States, that the last Monday of May next, (being the 31st day thereof,) has been fixed upon by him for the meeting of the first Session of the twenty-seventh Congress of the United States...

Now, therefore, by virtue of the authority vested by an Act of the General Assembly of this State entitled "An Act concerning the mode of choosing Senators and Representatives in the Congress of the United States," (Revised Statutes of N. C. Chapter 72d.) and to the end, that the Freeman of this State may be duly represented in the next Congress...
