KEEP IT BEFORE THE PEOPLE.

Keep it before the People—That the first grand act of REPUTATION of State obligation was perpetrated by Andrew Jackson. "I am the Government"—"I am the State"—and adding in defiance of all national or moral obligation he violated the pledged faith of the nation and removed the deposits.

Keep it before the People—That after the U States Bank became a State Institution, and a large holder of State Stocks, and stocks of Railroad Companies, the Loco Foco, in order to crush down that State Institution, commenced and prosecuted without mercy, a ceaseless war on State credit—on credit generally—and on all stocks created for State improvements.

Keep it before the People—That Defalcation and the plunder of the public money by public officers, first, became the "order of the day," under a Loco Foco Administration, by which "stealings and pickings" were daily winked at and tolerated.

Keep it before the People—That three-fourths of the State Debts were created by Loco Foco Legislatures—and that all State Stocks, created for Banking purposes, were created by Loco Foco Legislatures.

Keep it before the People—That Samuel Young, a Loco Foco Senator of this State, was the first to put forth in an official manner, and justify the repudiation of State Debts. And that the document avowing this practical doctrine, was republished and approved by his Loco Foco friends.

Keep it before the People—That the only States whose public authorities now threaten repudiation are Loco Foco States.

Keep it before the People—That the only persons which in this State have indirectly given any countenance to the repudiation of State Debts, or professed any belief that the States would repudiate, are Loco Foco presses.

Keep it before the People—That whilst more than three-fourths of the State Debts were created by Loco Foco Legislatures, all of the present National Debt was contracted by the Loco Foco Administration of Martin Van Buren.

Keep it before the People—That whilst four-fifths of the Safety Fund Banks were created by Loco Foco Legislatures, and the Stock divided among the Loco Foco leaders, bearing a premium of 10 per cent, that now, after inviting capitalists to such investments, the Loco Foco party proclaim, as part of their creed, that no Safety Fund Charter shall be renewed.

Keep it before the People—That while the Loco Foco party are ever professing their love for the laboring man, they are striving to deprive ten thousand laborers of their daily bread by stopping the public works on rail-roads and canals.

Keep it before the People—That the Loco Foco party threaten the repeal of the BANKRUPT LAW, passed by a Whig Congress, in obedience to the petitions of the People, for the relief of poor, unfortunate, honest debtors.

Keep it before the People—That that the Loco Foco party threaten the repeal of the act for distributing the proceeds of the Public Lands among the States.

Keep it before the People—That the Loco Foco party are pledged to restore and re-organize the odious Sub Treasury Law whenever they get the power so to do.

Keep it before the People—That the uniform policy of Martin Van Buren towards England was that of truckling and cowardly submission; and in pursuance of that dastardly policy, his confidential leaders in the Legislature last winter counselled and advocated the liberation of McLeod and compliance with the demands of Great Britain.

Keep it before the People—That whilst Loco Focoism would thus have humbled the Empire State, that the firmness of a Patriotic Whig Governor vindicated the Laws and protested the honor of New York, despite of the denunciation of foes or the apprehensions of pretended friends.

Keep it before the People—That if they desire to keep down the fearful demon of Loco Focoism, the enemy of social and national happiness they must come forth and place their votes in the Ballot Box.



Country Merchants who may wish to get their Goods up in the Summer and early in the fall, when the river is generally low, will find it to their advantage to patronize this line. Several Boatmen and Merchants and other residents of Cheraw and other places are interested, and feel confident that they can hold out such inducements to the back country as will be beneficial to all concerned. The business will be done principally by towing lighters which will insure a passage while there is two feet water in the channel.
