

STATE LEGISLATURE

Tuesday, Dec. 27.

IN SENATE.

Mr. Morehead presented a bill to amend an act, to incorporate the Salem manufacturing company...

The Senate then took up the bill, in alter the Electoral Districts of the State; which was read the second time...

Mr. Cothey then moved to amend the bill by striking the county of McDowell...

The bill, to repeal part of the first section of an act passed at the last session, restoring the appointment of Commissioners of Navigation and Pilots for the Cape Fear River...

A bill to incorporate the Nantahala Turnpike Company in the counties of Macon and Cherokee...

The resolution relative to the Treasurer of the State was taken up and read...

Resolved, That Charles L. Hinton, be and he is hereby appointed Agent for this State, for the purpose of receiving any monies offered for the entry of Lands...

Resolved further, That the said Charles L. Hinton, be and he is hereby authorized to pay off and discharge all or any resolutions that have been, or may be passed by the General Assembly...

The resolution concerning the Raleigh and Wilmington Railroad, was read a second time, and on motion of Mr. Joyner, ordered to lie on the table.

The bill concerning prosecution for perjury, passed its final reading.

HOUSE OF COMMONS.

Mr. Moore presented a bill to perpetuate the evidence of marriage, which passed its first reading.

[The bill provides that after the marriage an entry shall be made of the fact and by whom the ceremony was performed, &c., the Clerk to receive an additional fee for the entry.]

The bill in addition to the Revised Statutes, concerning the University of North Carolina, was taken up on its third reading.

Mr. Mendenhall, from the Committee on the Judiciary, to whom was referred the bill concerning sales under execution, reported the same back to the House...

Also, on the engrossed bill from the Senate, making securities on prosecution bonds liable for plaintiffs' costs, recommending its rejection.

Also, on the bill to prevent the sale of growing crops under execution, proposing a substitute as an amendment.

Mr. Barringer, from the Committee on the Judiciary, to whom was referred the bill to make real estate assess in certain cases, reported the same, and recommended its passage.

Mr. Baringer, from the Committee on Internal Improvements, to whom was referred the bill, entitled an Act to amend the first section of an Act to amend the 1st section of an act to reduce into one the several Acts concerning Pilots and Commissioners of Navigation...

Mr. Byrd presented a bill in relation to criminal prosecutions. Read the first time, and referred to the Committee on Propositions and Grievances.

[Relieves Grand Jurors from the task of making Presentments for assaults and batteries, and leaves it to the person injured to prosecute.]

Mr. Avery presented a memorial from citizens of Burke, praying that David Shultz, a cripple, may be permitted to retail liquor in said county, by paying a single tax, and a Resolution instructing the Committee on Propositions and Grievances to inquire into the expediency of granting the prayer of the petitioners...

On motion of Mr. Brumwell, the bill to authorize Joseph Clause, to build a mill on the Yadkin, in Davidson County, was taken up for consideration.

Mr. Moore, from the Committee on the Judiciary, to whom was referred the bill to amend the 80th section, 105th chapter Revised Statutes, concerning Registers, so far as relates to the county of Granville...

Mr. Brogden, from the Select Committee, to whom was referred the communication of the Governor, relative to the expenditure of the appropriation for the repairs of the Governor's house, &c., asked leave to make a report...

Mr. Ashe asked if the report had been adopted by a majority of the Committee, and if it had been read to the Committee...

The following bills were read a third time, and passed: a bill to amend an Act passed in the year 1838, to recharter the Bank of Cape Fear; and a bill to prevent the felling of timber in Ridge Fork, Abbott's Creek, Hamby's Creek and Mudds Creek...

The remarks of Mr. Biggs, were replied to by Mr. Moore, at some length, in which he deprecated the introduction of party politics on an occasion like the present...

Wednesday, Dec. 28.

IN SENATE.

Mr. Allison, of I, presented a memorial from many citizens of Stateville, asking the Legislature to construct a Turnpike Road from Fayetteville to some point in the West...

Mr. Jones offered a Resolution for Committee on the Judiciary, to enquire into the expediency of repealing the 14th Section, Chapter 39, Revised Statutes, concerning Alimony and Divorce...

Mr. Hester introduced a bill, to incorporate the Henderson Academy, in the Town of Henderson, in Granville county, which passed its final reading.

The Speaker presented to the Senate a communication from Charles L. Hinton accompanied by a statement from Thos. H. Wright, Cashier of the Bank of Cape Fear...

Mr. Albright introduced a bill, to amend the execution law. [Provides against sale of growing crops, until matured, such maturity to be determined by three persons.] It passed its first reading...

Mr. Edwards moved to reconsider the vote by which the bill, incorporating the Nantahala Turnpike Company was rejected, and the Senate agreeing to reconsider, the bill was recommitted to the Committee on Internal Improvement.

The Resolutions, introduced yesterday, by Mr. Allison, of Iredell, concerning the Public Treasurer, gave rise to some debate between Messrs. Edwards, Brown, Joyner and Wm P. Williams who moved to strike out the second Resolution which prevailed, and the Resolution as amended, passed its second, and (the Rules being suspended for the purpose), its final reading.

Mr. Reid called up the bill for the Relief of the People which, after being read, was advocated by Messrs. Shepard and Cooper, and opposed in an admirable speech by Mr. Edwards.

Mr. Edwards moved its indefinite postponement which by Ayes 41, Noes 5, was carried. Those who voted against the postponement, and thus for the bill, were Messrs. Cooper, Exum, Shepard, Swinson and Thomas—5.

HOUSE OF COMMONS.

Mr. Mills presented a memorial from citizens of Rutherford, praying the construction of a Turnpike from Fayetteville to the West, which was referred to the Committee on Internal Improvements.

Mr. Halsey, a bill to incorporate Swain's Academy in Tyrrell. Read the first time and passed.

Mr. Hawkins, from the Committee on Military Affairs, to whom was referred the memorial from citizens of Stokes county, praying to be transferred to another Brigade, made a report, stating that ample provision is already made in the Militia Law, and asked to be discharged from its further consideration.

Also, on the memorial and bill to establish the county of Jefferson, out of portions of Stokes, Guilford and Davidson, recommending its rejection. The bill was taken up on its second reading, and, on motion of Mr. Jones of Curritock, was indefinitely postponed.

Mr. Byrd presented a bill in relation to criminal prosecutions. Read the first time, and referred to the Committee on Propositions and Grievances.

Mr. Ashe, presented a bill supplemental to an act passed at the present session of the General Assembly, to lay off and establish the county of Union. Passed its first reading.

Mr. Nash, a bill to increase the compensation made to Witnesses in the Courts of Orange county, and for other purposes. Read first time and passed.

A communication, was received from His Excellency, the Governor, informing the Legislature that the Wilmington and Raleigh Railroad Company, will not be able to meet the instalment of \$50,000 due on the 1st January next, of the loan for which the State had endorsed, and suggesting the propriety of making some arrangement to meet it; which was accompanied by a memorial from the President of the Rail Road Company, on the same subject.

Mr. Moore, moved that they be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Mr. Biggs moved to amend, by inserting that they be sent to the Senate, with a proposition to refer to a Joint Select Committee; and accompanied his motion with some remarks, charging the whigs with having produced this extraordinary crisis in the affairs of the State.

The debate was continued until after three o'clock Messrs. Francis, Nash, Lord, Barringer, McRae, Jones, Cardwell and Mills participating.

Mr. McRae proposed an amendment in these words: and that the committee inquire into the expediency of foreclosing the mortgage on the road and selling the same; but subsequently withdrew it, with a notice that it should be renewed if the amendment of the gentleman from Martin prevailed.

The question was then taken on the motion to strike out all after the word, resolved, in the motion of Mr. Moore, and to insert the amendment of Mr. Biggs, which was decided in the affirmative.

Thursday, Dec. 29.

IN SENATE.

The bill to lay off the State into fifty Senatorial districts was further considered and amended in some particulars.

HOUSE OF COMMONS.

Mr. Biggs, from the committee on Finance, to whom was referred a bill for the equal distribution of the public funds, and for the relief of the people, reported the same to the House and recommended its rejection.

On motion of Mr. Patterson a substitute was inserted, laid on the table and ordered to be printed. [The substitute is nearly the same as the bill presented by Mr. Patterson some days ago.]

Mr. Francis presented a bill to authorize the construction of the Raleigh and Western Turnpike Road, which passed its first reading and was referred.

On motion of Mr. Brogden, leave was granted him to make a report from the joint select committee on repairs of the Government house and Expenditures for Furniture.

Upon the report being announced as the report from the said joint select committee, Mr. Ashe, one of said committee objected to its being received as such— a majority of said committee not having authorized said report to be made.

Mr. Francis presented a bill to authorize the construction of the Raleigh and Western Turnpike Road, which passed its first reading and was referred.

Several propositions were reported back from the committees and rejected.

The proposition of the Senate, to appoint two joint select committees to investigate the affairs of the banks, was concurred in.

Mr. Brogden from the joint committee on the repairs of the Government house, &c. reported a resolution to refund \$61 54 to the Governor.

Saturday, Dec. 31.

IN SENATE.

No business of importance transacted. HOUSE OF COMMONS.

Mr. Cardwell moved that the vote of the House on yesterday concerning in the proposition of the Senate to raise joint select committees for the purpose of investigating the situation, condition and proceedings of the Banks of this State, be reconsidered.

At this stage of the business, the Speaker arrested all further proceedings, and informed the House that the boat had arrived for proceeding to the installation of the Governor elect, when a message was sent to the Senate, inviting that body into this Hall for the purpose of witnessing the ceremony.

The hour of 12 having arrived, John M. Morehead, Esq. the Governor elect, attended by the Judges of the Supreme Court and the Committee of Arrangements, waited upon the General Assembly and took and subscribed the oaths of office, which were administered by Chief Justice Ruffin; after which the Governor addressed the two Houses in a brief but neat and appropriate speech.

The Senators then retired to their chamber, and the House proceeded to business being the consideration of Mr. Cardwell's motion to reconsider the vote by which a resolution was adopted, appointing committees to investigate the Banks.

On motion of Mr. Cardwell, the subject was then laid on the table and made the order of the day for Monday next.

Monday, Jan. 2, 1843.

IN SENATE.

The bill laying off congressional districts was further considered, amended, and passed its second reading.

HOUSE OF COMMONS.

Mr. Ashe made a report for himself and Alfred Mose, two of the joint select committees raised to inquire into the repairs of the Government House, &c., which was read, and on motion of Mr. Street, ordered to be laid on the table.

[This report contains a letter from the Governor, and certifies from the Secretary of State, Treasurer and Comptroller, stating that they acted with the Governor under the resolution of last Session, and gave their sanction to the entire work.]

The special order was then taken up— being the proposition of the Senate, to raise two joint select committees for the purpose of examining into the affairs of the different banks in this State.

Mr. Barringer moved to amend the same, by giving to the committees power to send for persons and papers, and at the recess of the Legislature, if necessary.— Mr. McRae moved to lay the proposition and proposed amendment on the table which was carried, 62 to 42— a party vote.
