# POLITICAL SAGACITY.

Have any of our readers forgotten the letter gritten by that patriot and statesman, HENRY Casy, from Raleigh, in 1844, on the subject of the annexation of Texas? If they have, let us refresh their memories, and they will see the far reaching sugarity of the man who ought

now to be at the head of our affairs. Here are one or two sentences :---

" Under these circumstances, if the Government of the United States were to acquire Tezas, i would acquire along with it all the incumbances which Texas is under, and among them percentual or suspended war between Mexico and Teras. Of that consequence there cannot be a ANNEXATION AND WAR WITH NEXICO ARE IDENTICAL. Now, for one, feertainly am not willing to involve this counr is a foreign war for the object of acquiring Tesas. I know there are those who regard such a war with indifference and as a triffing affair, on account of the weakness of Mexico, and her inability to inflict serious injury upon this country. But I do not look upon it thus lightly. I regard all wars as great calamities, to be avoided, if possible, and honorable peace whe wisest and truest policy of this country. What the United States most needs are union, neace, and patience. Nor do I think that the reakness of a power should form a motive, in iny case, for inducing us to engage in or to deprecate the evils of war."

Igain, listen to what he said :---

"It is useless to disguise that there are those who esponse and those who oppose the annex. ation of Texas upon the ground of the influence which it would exert, in the balance of politial power, between two great sections of the Union, I conceive that no motive for the acquisition of foreign territory would be more unfortunate, or pregnant with more fatal consemences, than that of obtaining it for the purpose d strengthening one part of the common confed. enty. Such a principle, put into practical veration, would menace the existence, if it did scertainly sow the seeds of a dissolution of Waion. It would be to proclaim to the world a instiable and unquenchable thirst for foregn conquest or acquisition of territory. For Tuday Texas be acquired to strengthen one man of the confederacy, to-morrow Canada may be required to add strength to another. And, der hat might have been obtained, still other and further acquisition would become necessary wequalize and adjust the balance of political ster. Finally, in the progress of this spirit imiversal dominion, the part of the Confeder. which is now weakest, would now find itafstill weaker from the impossibility of secuing new theatres for those peculiar institutions sich it is charged with being desirous to ex-But would Texas, ultimately, really add mugh to that which is now considered the mkest part of the Confederacy ? If my infination be correct it would not. According that the territory of Texas is susceptible of mision in five States of convenient size and of these, two only would be adapted to institutions, to which I have referred, and mother three, lying west and north of San Amain, being only adapted to farming and Bees ming purposes, from the nature of their soil, limate and productions, would not admit of institutions. 




