

GEN. TAYLOR'S LATEST LETTERS.

The National Intelligencer of the 25th ult. says: "The following letters are given to the Union of yesterday morning, as the latest despatches received from Gen. TAYLOR. They disclose his reasons for taking position at Agua Nueva, and communi- cation also the encouraging information that the had been reinforced by the arrival of General Wood's division before the report- ed attack of Santa Anna:

HEADQUARTERS ARMY OF OCCUPATION, Agua Nueva, 15 miles south of Saltillo, February 7, 1847.

Since I changed my headquarters in this place on the 5th instant, bringing forward, in the first instance, Lieutenant Colonel May's squadron of dragoons, two batteries, (Sherman's and Bragg's) and the regiment of Mississippi rifle- men, yesterday the second Kentucky and se- cond Louisiana regiments came up, and will be joined in a day or two by the other regiments of seven companies left in that town.

Although advised by Major General Scott to evacuate Saltillo, I am confirmed in my purpose of holding not only that point, but this position in front. Not to speak of the pernicious moral effect upon volunteer troops of falling back from points which we have gained, there are powerful military reasons for occupying this position. The scarcity of water and supplies for a long distance in front of the enemy either to risk an engagement in the field or to hold himself aloof from us; while, if we fall back on Monterey, we could establish himself strongly at Saltillo, and be in position to annoy more effectively our flank and our communications.

I have no intelligence from the interior more recent or authentic than that heretofore commu- nicated. There is understood to be no consid- erable force in our front, nor is it likely that any serious demonstration will be made in this direction. The frequent alarms since the middle of December seem to have been without sub- stantial foundation. I am happy to add that the evacuation of Saltillo is fast returning to the city. Under the judicious management of Major War- ren, a discreet officer of Illinois volunteers, who commands in the town, it is hoped that the peo- ple will remain quietly in their homes.

I respectfully enclose copies of statements showing the names of the officers and men re- cently captured by the enemy as reported in my despatch No. 11.

HEADQUARTERS ARMY OF OCCUPATION, Agua Nueva, February 14, 1847.

Since my last despatch of February 14th, the occupation of this position has been completed by the arrival of Brig. Gen. Wood with the remaining corps left in rear. The troops are now conveniently encamped, and are ready to take up excellent defensive position when necessary. Every thing is quiet in and about Saltillo.

I am urging forward as rapidly as practicable from the rear, and from the direction of Par- me, for, if joined by a sufficient force of the new regiments, I wish to be able to take ad- vantage of any opportunity that may offer to create a division in favor of Major Gen. Scott's operations. Of those new regiments, none have yet been reported to me, nor do I know how many I may calculate upon for service in this quarter.

I can communicate no very recent intelli- gence from the interior. Up to the 26th of Janu- ary, the Mexican Congress had done nothing to supply the wants of the army, which had received nothing for January, and but half the necessary funds for December. Rumors reach our camp from time to time of the projected ad- vance of a Mexican force upon this position, but I think such a movement improbable. The command is held at all times in readiness for the enemy.

I respectfully enclose a continuation of the list of killed, wounded, and missing in the operations before Monterey—as complete as can be made from the records in my pos- session. There yet remain to be reported the wounded of company A, 3d artillery; killed and wounded of the 4th artillery; and killed and wounded of the 2d (Col. Wool's) regiment of Texas mounted volunteers. These few remain- ing accounts, is presumed, can be supplied from the regimental returns or muster rolls on file in your office.

Our latest official dates from Washington are of the 10th January. The mail of yesterday, which brought Washington newspapers as late as the 15th, had nothing from your office.

RAIL ROAD MEETING.

On Monday the 24th ult., a meeting of the citizens of Davie county was called at the Courthouse in Mock- ville, to consider the advantages of the rail road pro- posed to be constructed between the South Carolina Rail- road and Charlotte, Mecklenburg county, N. C. The meeting was organized by the appointment of Lemuel Bingham, Chairman, and Samuel Howard, Secretary; when G. A. Miller explained the object of the meeting, and introduced the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the construction of the road from Charlotte to some point on the South Carolina rail- road is an object of the highest importance to the people of Davie county.

Resolved, That the agricultural interests of this county, are oppressed by the distance at which it is situated from a convenient market—that the profits of all busi- ness is diminished—the value of lands depreciated, and the prosperity of every class and every branch of indus- try is by this cause, impeded.

Resolved, That the proposed road will shorten our distance from market one half, and affords prospects of other and more extensive improvements—will alleviate the evils under which we suffer, and advance the pros- perity of the whole western part of North Carolina.

Resolved, That the Chairman of this meeting appoint delegates to attend the convention proposed to be held at Charlotte, on the 27th April next, and they are re- quested to use all exertions to secure the success of this enterprise.

FINANCIAL AFFAIRS.

From the Charleston News.

The finances of the country were never before in a condition so anomalous. The new channels into which capital is directed in consequence of the changes made in the British and American tariffs are of themselves sufficient to perplex the sagacity of the most shrewd mercantile men; but, in addition to these causes of derangement, the Mexican war and the Subtreas- ury have set at naught all anticipations founded on commercial and financial experience. It is impossible to say what phase the operations of banking and trade will present within the short- est period to which calculation may extend.— All general reasoning and rules founded on it are set at defiance. When the European de- mand for our breadstuffs and the rise of the Southern staples were set down as circum- stances which must incline the balance of trade in favor of the United States, the current of specie which commenced to set towards our shores would, it was anticipated, lay a sure foundation for a prosperous commerce throughout the present year.

But there intervened the Mexican war and the Subtreasury. Those merchants who had founded their calculations on the ordinary re- sults of a large balance of payments in favor of the United States began to pause. The banks were perplexed in their policy. A public loan succeeded of moderate amount, which absorbed some of the surplus capital, then perhaps ready for investment. This first loan, how- ever, withdrew none of the moneyed resources which were absolutely necessary to nourish commerce. The pressure on these resources was, if any, slight. But the subsequent loan of a much larger amount followed, giving the takers the option of Treasury Notes at the highest market rate of interest, and redeemable at a long period. This threw back on the banks their paper, in exchange for coin, by which a- lone the investment in Treasury notes could be made. This imports a new feature to our public loans. Combined with payments for duties in coin, it is impossible to measure the demand for specie by any known standard. Here, then are two concurrent causes in operation, either of which is calculated to derange the finances of the country. But when, in addition to these sources of disturbance, the changes of tariffs on both sides of the Atlantic, the demand for the staples of our soil, and the scarcity of ship- ping are taken into view, we are not surprised that ordinary principles of fiscal action on the part both of merchants and banks are lost in the confusion, which almost amounts to chaos, that has ensued.

MR. CALHOUN'S ANNEXATION POLICY.

The "Union" comments on Mr. Calhoun's agency in the annexation of Texas, and thus speaks: "Certainly there were, in various parts of the Union, many very well informed persons—old and staunch friends of annexation—who considered that the agency of Mr. Calhoun in that transaction might have been quite as well dis- pensed with; that the method of annexation adopted and unsuccessfully tried by him was far from being the best and safest method; that he unnecessarily and unwisely narrowed the ground of policy upon which he placed the measure; that he clogged it with many diffi- culties and perils not naturally belonging to it; that some of the incidents of his course in the matter, he failed to adopt any very scrupulously strict construction of the constitutional limits of Executive authority; and that, in one word, the Texan business was not well man- aged till it passed substantially out of Mr. Cal- houn's hands and into the hands of Congress. Then, indeed, in a mode quite different from the mode adopted by Mr. Calhoun, annexation was consummated; and, in the just and legiti- mate triumph of the achievement, at last happily accomplished, comparatively little attention was paid to any errors which might appear in the course of a statesman whose plan of annex- ation had most signally failed, even at the moment when annexation in itself was most popu- lar."

There can be no doubt but that "many very well informed persons" did think all this. But why has it never been said by the Union here- before now? Why has that print, entertaining all these opinions, and filled with these thoughts just found language to express its ideas? That is a question which the Union ought to answer and satisfactorily explain. Mr. Calhoun will see that he has been acting for and with men all along, who have secretly condemned his whole course and policy.—Alexandria Gaz.
