PASSED MIDSHIPMAN JOHN RINGGOLD HYNson of a respectable farmer in Maryland. He was a favorite in the Navy,-brave and generous, almost to a fault.

His conduct in aiding to destroy a Mexican schr. of war under the guns of the Castle at Vera Cruz, has already been heralded through the country; but it is not generally known that he was the first to plan this gallant act, which, in conjunction with Lieut. The plan was executed as follows. The party composed of Parker, Hynson, Rogers, and four seaman, was to pay a formal visit to an English man of-war, latein the afternoon. 
