REVENUE LAW.

We have once before published the subjoinel Act, but in order to give it greater publicity, we insert it again this week. The reader will do well to preserve it for future reference, for the sake of his own, and convenience of his mighbors.

The Revenue Law of North Carolina. The Act for raising additional revenue passed by the General Assembly of this State at the late session impose taxes according to the following Schedule :

On every dollar of annual interest, se. \$ cts. cured or owing from any solvent debt. or, whether an individual or as a corporator or copartner,

On every hundred dollars employed in buying and selling Slaves,

On every hundred dollars employed in every other species of trade,

On every dollar of dividend or profit due or received on sums of money vested in steam vessels, in stocks of any kind, or in shares of any incorporated or rading company, either in the State er out of it, if exceeding \$39, or if more than the person receiving is liable for on his or her own debis,

On all Surgeon Dentists, all practising Physicians, all practising Lawyers, and on all wher persons, (except Minliters of the Gospel of every denommation. Governor of the State and Judges of the Supreme and Superior Courts.) whose practice, salaries or ices, or all together, shall yield an annual income of five hundred dollars, 3 00

and on each additional \$500. On gold and silver plate and ornamental jewelry, of the value of \$50 or upwards, in use by the owner, 1 per cent on the value pr. annum. On barouches, huggies, gigs, sulkies, carriages, and pleasure vehicles of
