MELANCHOLY OCCURRENCE. — A valuable fe. male servant, obout 19 years of age, the property of E. D. M'Nair, esq., of this vicinity, was so severely burnt on Sunday morning last, by her dress catching on fire, that she died early on Monday morning. She was employed in bathing with camphire an aged servant suffering under an attack of rheumatism. Her back being towards the fire, her clothes caught, and the flames had made considerable progress before she discovered her danger. Wild with af-fright, she fled from the kitchen to the house, by which time she was perfectly enveloped in flames. Mr. M'Nair had been induced to return from church before the completion of the service, in consequence of the seeming indisposition of his little son, and did what he could to extinguish the fire, but the servant was so severely burnt that the physician at once pronounced her recovery doubtless. She lingered through the night, seemingly insensible to pain and died about 7 o'clock on Monday morning.

Though it failed to save the life of the servant, it seemed a providential interference that induced Mr. M'Nair to return home. In the room to which the servant retreated was a bed with curtains, and other light inflammable materials, which she passed near, and would have greatly endangered the house if none of the white family had been present .- Hillsborough


