There is living in my neighborhood a man who last completed his 100th year. He was born in the State of Delaware on the 6th of Oct. 1752. He came to this State before the Revolution, and was in the campaigns during that long and arduous struggle for liberty. He was with Gen. Ruffin at the battle of Ramsaur's Mill was fought, and he did not arrive in time to take any part in it. He was present the morning Lord Cornwallis entered the Catawba, and saw General Oglethorpe's horse; which circumstance he has never forgotten.
