Alkalies.— Best remedy is vinegat. Ammonia .- Remedy, lemon juice or vinegar; afterwards milk and water or flasseed tea. Alcohol. First cleanse out the stomach by

an emetic, then dash gold water on the head; and give ammonia (spirits of hartshorn.) Arsenic .- Remedies in the first place evac-

uate the stomach, then give the white of eggs, lime water or chalk and water, charcoal and the preparations of iron, particularly hydrate. Lead .- White lead and sugar of lead. Remedies, alum, cathartic, such as castor oil and epsom salts, especially.

Charcoal .- In poisons by carbonic gas, remove the patient to open air, dash cold water on the head and body, and stimulate nostrils and lungs by hartshorn, at the same time rubbing the chest briskly.

Corrosive Sublimate. - Give white of eggs reshly mixed with water, or give wheat flour and water, or soap and water freely.

Creosote.-White of eggs and the emetics. Bellodanna, or Night Henbane .- Give emet ics, and then plenty of vinegar and water or lemonade.

Mushrooms, when paisenous .- Give emetics, and then plenty of vinegar and water, with dose of either if handy.

Nitrate of Silver, (lunar caustic.) give a strong solution of common salt and then emet-Opium .- First give a strong emetic of mus-

tard and water, then strong coffee and acid drinks, dash cold water on the head. Laudanum -Same as opium. Nux Vomica .- First emetics, then brandy.

Oxalic Acid.-Frequently mistaken for ep som salts. Remedies, chalk, magnesia, or soap and water freely, then emetics. Nitrate of Polash, or Saltpelre. - Give emet-

ics, then copious draughts of flaxserd tea, milk and water, and other soothing drinks. Prussic Acid .- When there is time, admin. ister chloring in the shape of soda or lime .-

Hot brandy and water. Hartshorn and turpentine also useful. Snake Bites, &c .- Apply immediately strong hartshorn, and take it internally, also give sweet

oil and stimulants freely -apply a ligature tight above the part bitten, and then apply a cupping Tartar Emetic .- Give large doses of tea made of galls, Peruvian bark, or white oak

bark. Tobacco.-First an emetic, then astringent tea, then stimulants.

Virdigris .- Plenty of white of egg and wa White Vitriol .- Give the patient plenty of

milk and water. In almost all cases of poisoning, emetics are

highly useful, and of these, one of the very hest, because more prompt and ready, is the common mustard flower or powder, a teaspoon full of which, stirred up in warm water, may, be given every ten minutes, until free vomiting can be obtained. Emetics and warm demulcent drinks, such

as milk and water, flaxseed or slippery elm tea, chalk water, &c., should be administered without delay. The subsequent management of the case will of course be left to a physician. Hartford Times.

A Bell buoy recently arrived at Norfolk, Va. It is to be stationed on Hatteras shoal. It will not only mark the position of the shoal in the day time, but is upplied with a bell of great sound, capable of being heard several miles distant. in almost any weather, which is rung by the motion given to the buoy by the sea. Vessels will thereby be enabled, either by day of night, to know when they are approaching this dangerous shoal.
