AN ACT making appropriations for the payment of invalid and other pensions of the United States for the year ending the 20th of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four.

Be it enacted by the Sonate and House of Representations of the United States of America in Congress assembled. That the following sums be and the same are hereby appropriated, out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the payment of pensions for the year ending the 30th of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four:

For invalid pensions under various acts, four hundred and eighty thousand dollars.

For pensions to widows and orphans under the acts of July the fourth out these these sections.

For pensions to widows and orphans under the acts of July the fourth, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six, and July the twenty-first, one thousand eight hundred and forty-sight thousand dollars.

#### ANSWER TO THE COURIER'S INQUIRY.

The Charleston Courier seems to be anxious o know why Mr. Harris, the town marshall of Charlotte, advertises for 500 or 1000 wagons to be employed in hauling from this place to Columbia or to Charleston, as should have been stated in the advertisement.

We are requested to inform the Courier that he plain and simple reason is our people desire to have their produce transported to market. The general impression in this neighborhood is that the Rail Roads between this place and Charleston were built for this purpose, but as vet they have failed to answer the honest and anxious expectations of the people; so they are forced, by considerations of sheer necessity, to fall back upon the old republican plan of getting their produce to market. There are bundieds on bundreds of bales of cotton lying at our depot, and about the streets of Charlotte, which have been accumulating for months, without any apparent efforts on the part of the Rail Road officers to accommodate our people, and relieve their wants in this regard. Now, perhaps, if the Courier and other Charleston and Columbia papers would speak out on this subject, it might be that their fulminations would effect some good in behalf of our citizens. The still small voice of our country thunder is too solt to be heard amid the din of clashing interests in the great commercial cities of Columbia and Charleston. If the cars would only take 400 bales per day-and they might take 500-for us, our docks would be kept measurably clear .- Charlotte Whig.
