A Scene in Court - The Criminal Court room at Baltimore was crowded on Tues: day by persons auxious to witness the sentence of Thomas Conner, convicted of the willful murder of Captain Hutchinson. Soon after he was brought in his nervous system gave way, and he lay down on the bench in the lock up, completely prostrated. The Rev. Mr. Foley, of the Cathedral, who has been assidoous in his attentions to the unbappy lad at the jail, was with him in the court, and endeavored to console him as well as he could -Shortly after 10 o'clock, on motion of Mr. Gwinn, he was brought to the bar for sep tence, and being unable to walk, was supported by two of the deputy wardens to the bar, one standing on either side to hold him up whilst there. He was deadly pale, his head falling forward on his breast, and presenting an appearance at once calculated to enlist the sympathy

and commiseration of every beholder. A more miserable, abject looking human being has never been seen placed at the bar of the Criminal Court. Judge Stump pro ceeded to pronounce the sentence of the law. (condemning the prisoner to be hung.)

During the pronouncing of the sentence Conner gradually sank back till he rested in the chair in the bar, the officers sustaining him there, and his right hand slipping from that of the Rev. Mr. Foley .-At the close of the remarks of the court he was totally helpless and without any apparent life. He was taken up bodily and conveyed to the lock up for a few minutes, and from thence was carried like a corpse to the prison van, in which he was placed and returned to prison. The brave and the desperado when at large, and before conviction, is now one of the most pitiable cowards ever lived, in the anticipation of his ignoble end. He did
