PLAIN TALK TO MERCHANTS.

We happened the other day to fall in with a Southern merchant who has been to New York buying his goods. After a long conversation he expressed his opinion, that if the merchants at Baltimore would use proper exertions, a very large Southern trade could be secured. The gentleman informed us that he stopped in Baltimore this spring for the first time.

"I bought a few of my goods," said he, among other things during the conversation, "and there were several others with me who did the same. We were pleased, and next season I expect to buy more. I was astonished to find such a market. The fact of it is, that we know nothing of Baltimore's advantages. Her merchants ought to advertise in our country papers, but above all, gentlemen of business capacity and business habits—plain every day sensible men, with no nonsense about them, ought to make regular tours through the South. It does no good to send a young, inexperienced man, who merely walks around the streets smoking his cigar—looking like anything but a business man, to hand in a card and say, 'happy to see you when you come to Baltimore.' Some merchants seem to think that a person from the South however young and inexperienced is fit to send out to obtain business. We may like him very well, but we want to talk with business men and expect to have business inducements held out to us and explained with intelligence before we act. The agent ought to be a man of address and capacity. Let him go to a good district and take time to cultivate an acquaintance. We will all be happy to see him—invite him to our homes, and if he can show us the advantages of his country, we will give him the information to tell the merchants there."

This is plain every day common sense.—We can give the name of the merchant to any man who will call and ask for it. The above substance of his conversation, and though it may appear cutting, there is good sense in it. There was a party of them and they all spoke in the highest terms of Baltimore, and the advantages of her market and enterprise of her merchants. The advice was given from the friendly spirit, and the same manner we can give it to whom it may concern."

ANTIQUE RESEARCHES AND THE BIBLE.

SANTA ANNA DECLARED PRESIDENT OF MEXICO.

A telegraphic despatch from New Orleans contains the formal proclamation of the election of Gen. SANTA ANNA to the Presidency of Mexico. President LOMBARDINI, with his Secretary and Gen. URAGUA and CARRERA, assembled on the 17th ultimo and opened the election. Each State cast but one vote, and the result was that eighteen States voted for Santa Anna and five for other candidates. Gen. SANTA ANNA was then formally declared President of the Republic of Mexico, amid the greatest manifestations of enthusiasm. On reaching the capital he is to be immediately inaugurated, for which the greatest preparations are making.
