We have seen some statements made by farmers, where even wet lands were ben efited by deep ploughing: we, however, never have been able to discover the propriety of deepening such lands, until after the operation of draining has been performed, and the land given time enough to be relieved of its surplus water.

Permit us now to direct your attention to the following facts and opinions illus trative of the benefits of giving growing erops ample pasturage:

Mr. Stephen V. R. Trowbridge, a Michigan wheat grower, says in speaking of the preparations of the land for wheat:

"We plough from eight to ten inches.

Mr. J. G. Wilson, of Fort Wayne, Allen county, Indiana, in giving an account of a field of 70 acres that averaged 40 bushels of wheat to the acre, says:
