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The Largest Nursery in the World.

It has been some years since Rochester has become the head quarters for nurseries in America... From only a few acres in extent, as they existed fifteen or twenty years since...

But it is not our present object to pursue this inquiry, but to give to our readers the results of a few hours personal observation of one of the establishments to which we have alluded...

Ellwanger and Barry had in regular employ at the time of our visit, over one hundred hands... In the spring, they have two or three hundred...

They employ twenty five horses. During all the early part of the season, these were all required in cultivating the rows... at present only eighteen are needed for this purpose...

We observed single hills, of thirty or forty acres each, of the many which alone would be regarded as large for an entire nursery... A block of ninety thousand cherry trees, one year from the bud...

Two hundred thousand were picked out from them early in summer, without any sensible diminution of their numbers... As nearly as we could estimate, there were at least two hundred thousand...

Their ornamental department is on a very large scale. They have five hundred feet in length of glass propagating houses... seven acres in extent...

In their grape houses, they have over ten thousand excellent bunches of fine growth for sale... Their collection of bearing specimen pear trees is unequalled in this country...
