

...the President had carefully considered the notes of Lord Clarendon of the 2nd of April, and is much gratified by the conciliatory and wise tone of the British government, there has been such an understanding, as satisfactory to the President, and the main complaint respecting the British government is thus removed. But the President extremely regrets that he cannot concur with Lord Clarendon in the opinion that Mr. Cranston and the General of New York, Paula Octavia and Cincinnati are not implicated in these proceedings. Regarding those who have no connection with this government, he has nothing to say of their conduct, but in the cases of the individuals mentioned, he deems it proper that their relationship with this government should be clear. In fact, this is a matter, he does not intend to make any interruption in the diplomatic relations between the U. States and Great Britain, but, on the contrary, is desirous of keeping the two countries upon the most friendly footing. Mr. Cranston's conduct was asked expressly on the ground of his connection with the British government, which had rendered it impossible for the representative of Great Britain, and this government, to do so in the same manner, the withdrawal of which would be a violation of the law of nations, and a violation of the rights of the United States, contrary to the repeated instructions of their own government. This difficulty did not rest upon the testimony of the British and French, but on the original letters from Mr. Cranston and others.

After the reading of the despatch and accompanying papers in the Senate, they were referred to a committee on Foreign Relations. A slight debate ensued. Mr. Mason spoke in complimentary terms of the ability with which the papers had been translated by Mr. May. Mr. Cass thought that no profit would be made out of the official of the Administration, unless England was determined to go to war. Mr. Tamm thought that if this government was satisfied with the explanation of Lord Clarendon, Mr. Cranston would not have been translated. Mr. Mason replied that this government had not expressed its satisfaction with the explanation of the British government that they intended no violation of law, but he was now turned out that Mr. Cranston acted in violation of the instructions and instructions of his own government. Mr. Tamm did not believe that England or her officers had violated the law of nations. While the matter was pending, he did not choose to attend to the papers against our government, but he would not say that he disapproved the translation, which the papers had been translated from one language into another.

It is thought this light-colored translation will not do much to break the relations existing between England and this country.

**INVESTIGATION OF THE SENATE ASSAULT.**

WASHINGTON, May 28.—The House committee of investigation called on Mr. Sumner today in discharge of their duty regarding the recent assault. He was heard, but gave his testimony in a very brief and guarded manner. He was unable to answer the question of the exact time of the assault, but he was positive that he was not in the room at the time of the assault.

The following is Mr. Sumner's statement on oath: "I attended the Senate on Thursday, the 27th of May. After some formal business, a message was received from the House of Representatives announcing the death of a member, but only from Mr. Mason. I was summoned for a brief private conference with the Chairman, with the rest of the members of the Senate. I continued in my seat, occupied with my pen. While I was in my seat, in order to be in season for the next session was soon because I was preparing several papers, which I desired to present with me, but I answered them promptly and briefly, evening myself for the reason that I was much excited.

As I looked up, with my pen in my hand, I saw a tall man, whose countenance was so familiar, standing directly over me, and at the same moment I caught these words: "I have read your speech this evening carefully. It is a libel on South Carolina and Mr. Butler, who is a traitor to me."

While these words were still passing through his lips, he commenced a succession of blows with a cane on my bare head, by the first of which I was stunned and lost my sight. I no longer saw any one.

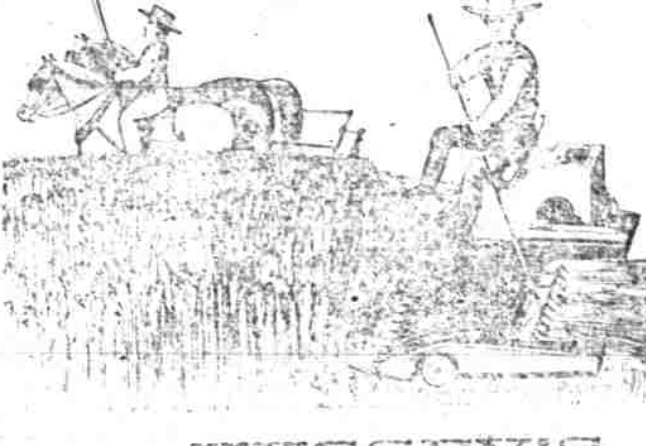

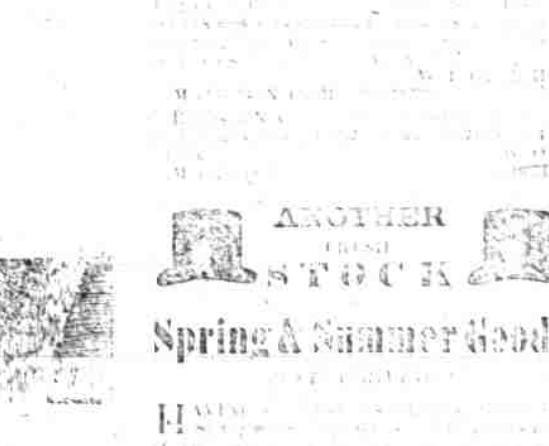
