Newbern is an old town, possessing wealth and population, and we are glad to see that her merchants have been fully aroused to a sense of their own interests and duties in a commercial point of view.

This much said for Newbern, may we not be permitted to say that Carolina City, considering its youth, has done wonders. Already have some four or five vessels, heavily freighted with rich merchandise, arrived at her wharf, and carried off to Northern ports full freighted.

We cannot see how the simple announcement of an arrival at Carolina City, a few hours or even days, more or less, than were consumed in making the voyage, can affect the interests of Newbern, it is certainly too trivial a matter on which to get up a question of veracity, and by which to attempt to convict any honorable man of falsehood.

Freights. We refer to this subject again in order that our former statements may be correctly understood. In our first article we showed that the freight on a lot of Bacon from Baltimore to Charlotte cost \$25 30 more by way of Newbern than by way of Charlotte.

If that paper means to say that we desire to disorganize and injure the roads between here and Newbern, it is wrong and cannot maintain the assertion with facts. We cannot be expected to suppress facts through fear of injuring the Newbern route.
