

ACCEPTANCE OF MR. BELL.

Letter of Mr. Hunt to Mr. Bell.

Baltimore, May 11, 1860.

Dear Sir: It has become my agreeable duty, as the presiding officer of the National Union Convention, which terminated its session in this city last evening, to inform you that you have received the nomination of that body as its candidate for the office of President of the United States.

After a frank interchange of sentiment, in which the merits of all the distinguished candidates presented for our consideration were canvassed in the most friendly spirit, the Convention resolved, with entire unanimity and great enthusiasm, to place your name before the American people as the chosen representative of its principles of constitutional liberty and union.

With a just appreciation of your known moderation and justice; your uniform support of wise and benevolent measures of legislation; your firm and heroic resistance of the repeal of the Missouri compromise and all kindred measures calculated to engender sectional discord; and your life-long devotion to the union, harmony, and prosperity of these States, it was decided with one accord that you are the man for the crisis, and that with your honored name inscribed on our banner, and repeated charges with a strong voice in unity without foundation. No trust is set at.
