his disinterested patriotism, by the distin-
guished honors which she has conferred him.
Lieut. Col. Cantwell and Major Burton, are
just the men for the times and place; and we
predict that the gallant men who elected them
will never have any cause to regret the choice
they have made.

From the Charlotte Bulletin,
Raleigh, May 16.
Lincoln has pledged himself to the Govern-
ments of all the States that they shall be
no compromise or suspension of war until
the United States flag floats over all the
national property.

ALEXANDRIA, May 16.
There are many deserters from the Lin-
coln ranks.
The papers of Elmira and other places
in New York are calling for old clothes
for the soldiers, stating that some of them
have not changed linen for three weeks.
It is believed there are 400 men at Har-
per's Ferry and 8100 at points near it and
commanding approaches.
Many members of the New York 9th
Regiment have gone home, their
term of enlistment having expired.

From the South Carolina,
ELECTION OF OFFICERS.
RICHMOND, May 16.
At an election held this day, E. P. Jones
was elected Lieutenant Colonel and A. D.
Lowry Major of the Second Palmetto
Regiment, South Carolina Volunteers.

LATEST FROM MONTGOMERY.
MONTGOMERY, May 16.
The doings in Congress to-day were un-
important.
Capt. Fitz is here, having resigned from
the United States service, and tendered
his services to the Confederate Govern-
ment.

ALEXANDRIA, May 16, 1861.
The collectors of the Customs in North
Carolina and Virginia have ceased to make
returns to the Department at Washington.
It is understood that Virginia is exempted
from the operations of the blockade.

WASHINGTON, May 16, 1861.
Many of the troops here refuse to take
the oath on account of the municipal
authorities of their homes refusing to fur-
nish assistance to their families.

THE POST OFFICE DEPARTMENT.
MONTGOMERY, May 16.
The Postmaster General's proclamation
was issued to-day, announcing that he will
commence the control of the postal ar-
rangements on the 1st of June.

WASHINGTON, May 16, 1861.
A resolution was passed the Convention
sitting here, recommending the adjournment
of the Convention to be held on the 11th of June, to be
composed of counties favoring a separation of
the State. After the adoption of the
above the Convention adjourned sine die.

BALTIMORE, Md., May 16, 1861.
This city is occupied by federal troops.
Regiments are organizing in Maryland
to support the administration.
ALEXANDRIA, May 16.
Schooner Indiana, with a cargo of nails
for this port, was seized to-night, by the
United States steamer Pawnee.

WASHINGTON, May 16.
No additional troops arrived to-day.
New York, May 16.
The steamer Bowman has arrived from
Fortress Monroe, with the women and chil-
dren of the garrison, an attack being con-
sidered not improbable.

MILITARY MOVEMENTS, &c.
RICHMOND, May 15.
Richmond is quiet to-day. A clash of
arms is looked for shortly at Harper's Fer-
ry or Norfolk. We learn nothing further
to-day in regard to Fortress Monroe. Sev-
eral thousand troops arrived here to-day.
Gen. Bonham and staff have gone into
camp at the Reservoir.
All the South Carolina troops have been
mustered into the service of the Confed-
erate States.

A large and enthusiastic meeting of the
Baltimoreans in this city, was held this
evening at Market Hall. Daniel Rateliff,
Esq. was called to the chair. Addresses
were delivered by Hon. Edmund Ruffin, of
Virginia, Clarke, and others. Preliminary
steps were taken to organize a regiment of
Marylanders. The meeting adjourned to
meet on Thursday, at 12 m.

BALTIMORE, May 15.
Gen. Butler has issued a proclamation
stating that he has occupied Baltimore to
enforce respect to the laws, both State and
Federal, and directs that all manufacturers
of arms report to him. He forbids all
transportation of arms and stores South;
requests all officers of the Maryland militia
to report to the General in command; pro-
hibits the display of any flags, banners,
emblems or devices of the Confederate
States, and declares all persons who exhibit
them give evidence of a design to afford
aid and comfort to the enemy.
Gen. Butler has seized the arms pur-
chased by the city, and had Hon. Winans,
Esq. of the House of Delegates, arrested in
the cars as he was returning from the
Legislature, refusing the bail offered, and
would not permit other members to see
him, nor would he give Gov. Hicks any
reason for the arrest.

The Governors of Ohio, Pennsylvania,
Indiana and Illinois pledge their States to
protect the Unionists of Virginia, Kentucky
and Missouri.
The small pox has undoubtedly broken
out in the Capitol at Washington.

The blockade. Secretary Welles, in reply
to interrogations from Philadelphia, says: "All
neutral vessels will be allowed a reasonable
time, fifteen days, to leave port, with or with-
out cargo after the blockade is actually in-
stituted."
Maryland in the Abolition Congress. Gov.
Hicks has issued his proclamation designating
Thursday, the 22nd of June, as the day for
holding a special election in Maryland for the
choice of members of the Congress which is to
assemble in special session at Washington, on
the 4th of July.
