Richmond, July 23. Congress, to-day, appointed a Committee composed of one member from each State, to look after the sick and wounded brought to Richmond.

FROM WASHINGTON. Washington, July 23. The Secretary of War, Simon Cameron, has telegraphed the New York Union Defence Committee as follows:

Carr coming up knocked the negro down twice with his club, when the fellow clinched in upon him cutting away, but fortunately only through Carr's clothes.
