

From the Charlotte Bulletin. Confederate Congress.

Richmond, Aug. 2. Congress has passed, and the President has approved several Acts today, amending the Public Defiance, laws of Treasury Notes and Revenue appropriations for the Navy.

Another Battle and Victory—Gen. McCulloch on the Field—A Confederate Victory—600 Federalists Killed and many Captured.

Richmond, Aug. 2. Reliable information received here via Nashville, Tenn., states that Gen. McCulloch with 12,000 Confederates attacked the Federalists at Springfield, Miss., on Friday the 28th July, killing about 600 and taking about as many prisoners.

FROM WASHINGTON.

Washington, Aug. 2. Official Di patches to Gen. Patterson will show that the entire blame of the Bull's Run disaster rests on his disobedience. Positive orders were given him to engage Johnston. That being impossible, to get between Johnston and Manassas.

Several Blounts were arrested but were released—all awaiting allegiance to Lincoln. Three steamers, from Fortress Monroe, at the mouth of the Potomac River have been fired on and got aground in attempting to escape.

Secretary Cameron has ordered all slaves confined in Alexandria to be liberated and employed as laborers in future.

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Washington, Aug. 1. The Fire Zouaves have been paid off. Dix is closely watching the Maryland Legislature to prevent them from passing an Ordinance of Secession in Secret Session.

Gen. McClelland expressed his opinion that this will be an artillery War, and asks for as many Batteries as can possibly be provided.

A line of pickets extending along the Potomac to Harper's Ferry, has been ordered out in order to prevent communication between the Maryland and Southern forces.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1. The whole of the killed, wounded and missing of the Fire Zouaves amount to 235. The balance are to be sent home, being thoroughly disorganized and demoralized.

Prince Napoleon and a portion of his suite left New York for Washington, today, leaving Princess Clothilde and other ladies in New York.

The New York World says that Gen. Beauregard is reconnoitering, in person within four miles of the chain Bridge. It is reported that ten Southern Scouts have been captured near the Bridge.

NEW ORLEANS, July 31. The Louisiana State Bank declares a dividend, this evening, of 8 per cent. out of profits for the last six months, and reserves a large surplus.

We present below the mournful catalogue of honored names belonging to the Sixth Regiment of N. C. State Troop's who fell or were wounded by the side of their gallant, lamented commander, Col. C. F. Fisher, in the action on Sunday, the 21st of July, 1861. The catalogue is officially correct, and may be relied on.

Company A—Capt. KIRKLAND, Commanding. Killed—Private Wm. D. Hanner, Barney Bleasny.

Company B—Lieut. PARKER, Commanding. Killed—Private Van Buren Oakley. Mortally Wounded—2d Lieut. W. P. Mansum.

Company C—Capt. FARELAND, Commanding. Killed—Private Geo. A. Hutchins, Robert Falkner.

Company E—Capt. AVERY, Commanding. Mortally Wounded—Private Joshua M. Sorens.

Company F—Lieut. CARTER, Commanding. Killed—Private James P. Stewart, J. Simpson.

Company G—Capt. CHAZON, Commanding. Killed—Private George Noah, Amos B. Currier, Jacob B. Corbitt, Jacob S. Smith, James D. Setzer, John Hess, Jacob Sobitt.

Company H—Capt. MYRENESS, Commanding. (Not directly in the engagement.) Private John W. Evans, band shot off.

Company I—Capt. YORK, Commanding. Mortally Wounded—Sergeants Hiram Sears, John W. Wilder, Private Jos. T. Morris.
