A Northern Peace Petition.

The following is a copy of the petition presented to the Federal House of Representatives by Mr. Wood, of New York: To Abraham Lincoln, President of the United States: We, the undersigned residents of Prattville, Greene County, N. Y., do respectfully petition; that, whereas, civil war now exists between a portion of the United States and what are known as the Confederate States, prostrating business of every kind, and producing an estrangement of the people of the two sections of our once glorious country, likely to be restored by said war, (which also is of doubtful result to Northern arms); We advise a compromise between the said sections on the basis of the Crittenden Compromise; giving to the slave States slavery protection in the common territories, or an acknowledgment of their independence; either of which, in our opinion, be honorable to our Government, and preferable to a civil war.

Important.

A Mr. Daniel, of Aberdeen, Miss, publishes the following statement, which we think important to be known, and which our people should at once test by actual experiment. He says: "There are but few persons who know that a shot-gun, with a ball to fit it, the same as a rifle, with parching, will throw a ball from four to six hundred yards, with as much force and accuracy as a rifle. Moulds for them are easily made. I shot a common double-barrelled gun against Col's rifle, and I won the nearest shot two hundred and fifty yards. Nearly every man has a gun, and by this means he has as deadly a weapon to an enemy as any that can be made. If any one doubts it let him just try it."

A Northern Soldier's Opinion.—The Baltimore Republican thus gives a Northern soldier's opinion of the Southern army: He states that the accuracy of their artillery was never excelled, and the discipline, equipment and efficiency of their cavalry never equalled by European armies. The horses seemed to partake of the spirit of their riders, and were disciplined and drilled to the highest perfection. He also avers that an attempt to conquer the South cannot be accomplished, and that an army such as Napoleon carried over the Alps, or in his campaign in Russia, would be inadequate to the task of reaching Richmond.

Peter Adams has been elected without opposition, State Senator from Guilford county, in place of Gov. Morehead, resigned, (being a member of the confederate Congress.)

Lincoln's "Blood" Wounded and Poisoned.

The conduct of the Federal government towards those unfortunate members of its "Grand Army," is infamous; and if any more yankees volunteer or enlist, with the expectation of similar treatment after every battle, they must be fools indeed. Not an attempt made to carry off their wounded, or to see to their needs in captivity; not a man sent to bury their dead; not a proposition made to relieve any of their men in Richmond as prisoners of war, by exchanging for them such of ours as they may hold as prisoners. It is infamous; showing an indifference to the fate of their soldiers such as was probably never before heard of.—Fayetteville Observer.

—Among the rich things picked up on the Manassas battle field was a diary, in which, under date of June 30th, it is thus recorded:—"The Fourth Regiment from Maine arrived this day—charges made against the Chaplain for selling franked envelopes belonging to the soldiers."
