FROM MANASSAS. Richmond, Nov. 26. At Manassas the Federal and Confederate camps indicate an engagement in a day or two.

FROM RICHMOND. Richmond, Nov. 26. An official dispatch, dated Obannonville, 5 o'clock, Monday afternoon, says, "all continues quiet; the enemy's ships keeping at a safe distance."

FROM NASHVILLE. Nashville, Nov. 25. A gentleman who arrived here yesterday, and who passed through Louisville on the 17th, says that two thousand Federal cavalry arrived in Louisville on that day, said to be from Ohio.

FROM MANASSAS. Manassas, Va., Nov. 27.—Thirty prisoners of war, belonging to the Third Pennsylvania Cavalry Regiment, were captured yesterday near Vienna, by a detachment of Ransom's North Carolina Cavalry Regiment.

LOUISVILLE, Nov. 21. Andy Johnson has arrived en route for Eastern Kentucky. Jon says that the Federal Congress will hold its session till summer, and intimates that the cotton the Federals obtained at the South by force will be small.

SEIZURE OF MESSRS. MASON AND SLIDELL IN THE NORTH. Nashville, Nov. 26.—The special Washington correspondent of the New York Times of the 18th instant says there is increasing confidence in the entire correctness of the conduct of Captain Wilkes in taking Messrs. Slidell and Mason, and I am informed that Secretary Chase has expressed his regret that Commander Wilkes did not, at the same time, seize the British mail vessel.
