Another Victory. Richmond, May 27.—There was heavy skirmishing from 1 to 7 o'clock this afternoon, in the direction of Hanover Court House, and it is believed to be in that immediate vicinity.

Second Dispatch. In the skirmish this p. m., at Hanover Court House, the 25th New York and 9th North Carolina regiments were principally engaged.

BY AN ADVERTISEMENT IN THE public papers, signed W. S. Ashe, you are informed that he will appoint, and send agents through every County in the State, to borrow, purchase, and if necessary, to suppress all the arms now in the hands of private citizens.

But while I notify you that these agents have no lawful authority to seize your private arms, and you will be protected in preserving the means of self defence, I must also explain to you in this emergency, as an act of the highest patriotism and duty, that you should discount to the proper State authorities, all public arms, Muskets or Rifles, within your knowledge, and of selling to the State all the arms, the property of individuals, which can be traced.
