Ens.—What shall we substitute for guano? I propose urine not only as a substitute for guano but every way equal to it, in all the elements of fertility, for though deficient in phosphate of lime, it is much richer in the elements of a much richer in the elements of ammonia. I now. in the second place, propose ashes as another important substitute for guano. Ashes, though destitute of ammonia, are richer in all the salts that constitute a richer manure than guano. To prepare, then, a univer-sal fertilizer, equal to the best guano and superior to any of the phosphates, superphosphates or artificial guano, prepared by Prof. Mapes or any other American Prof., I would propose to the farmer to make a compost of his barn-yard manure and ashes. And when I say barnyard manure, I include the urine with the solid. In this compost, I would also put the excrement of the family, with all the waste sads, and whatever absorbents may be used to save the urine and the suds. I see not how the farmer could add to the quality of such a compost. If he wish to add to the quantity of his manure, he may add any amount of common muck and air slacked lime. with smaller quantities of the different salts of potash, soda and magnesia. Such a compost could be made by any and every farmer and mechanic or profossional man even, and at a cost less than half that of guano or any of the phosphates or artificial mixtures, now offered for sale. I am almost every day inquired of, relative to the value and use of the dif ferent fertilizes, now advertised for sale in cities, and my invariable answer is make your own guano as I have above directed. Or at least, exhaust your own resources before you parchase foreign manures.

James Lowry, an old man, is a tanner, living in Marshall county, Tenn, and although comparatively poor, and both his tons in the Confederate army, he resists the temptation to make money by charging exorbitant prices for his leather and shoes. He has been offered one dollar a pound for all his leather and refused to take it, and is selling to his neighbors and all who want it for their own use and not for speculation, at fifty cents a pound. He is selling shoes and boots about targe or four hundred per cent, cheaper than spec ulators and extertioners are selling them at. None can buy from him but those who want them for their own use.
