The Fifth North Carolina.—We learn that
Col. McRae's resignation has been accepted
by the President. Lieut. Col. P. J. Sinclair,
(formerly editor of the Fayetteville Carolinian)
has also resigned.
Cap. Thomas M. Garrett, of Bertie, has
been promoted to Colonel vice McRae. Col.
Garrett was elected to the Senate from Bertie
last August, but declined the honor, having
determined never to quit the field alive
as long as our soil was invaded.

Isaac K. Pearce, promoted to be Captains—
Theodore DeS. Deans, George W. Armstrong
and Robert E. Pulley, appointed Second

Fire.—Last evening, about 7 o'clock, the
alarm of fire was given and found to proceed

house adjoining in which was stored about
100 bales of cotton, corn, bagging and sun-

building.
The fire was the work of an incendiary.—

ing only partly covered by insurance.—N. C.

Confederate States Prison Items.—Com-
missioner Ould yesterday received a dispatch
from Petersburg announcing the arrival at
City Point of four steamers, sent up under a
flag of truce to carry away the paroled pris-
oners from Richmond. Their carrying ca-
pacity was estimated at eighteen hundred,
and that number will be gotten ready to start
down to-day.
But twenty-five paroled Confederates came
up.
Two lots of prisoners were received at the
Lobby on Saturday from General Heth in
East Tennessee, and one lot from Gordons-
ville, the latter captured by General Hamp-
ton's cavalry.—Rich. Examiner.
