

Remedy for Hog Cholera.

Wet some shelled corn in a basket with some spirits of turpentine, and throw a handful of the corn to each hog every two or three days for two or three times.

Another farmer recommends that fine tops be either kept in the slop or boiled with meal and fed on that.

To Dye Cotton or Wool.

A lady friend sends us the following recipe for dyeing cotton or wool brown:

Take the bark of the root of a common wild plum—boil in iron or brass, as most convenient until the dye looks almost black. Strain, and add a small quantity of copperas dissolved in a small quantity of the dye.
