Militia Officers are ordered to seize all wool purchased for transportation beyond the limits of the State, contrary to the proclamation of the Governor.

Notice to all whom it may concern.

THE UNDERSIGNED having been appointed by the Court Commissioner for Rowan County, under the Act for the relief of the families of soldiers who are in indigent circumstances, hereby gives notice that he will be in Salisbury on Monday and Tuesday of every week commencing on Monday the 6th of April for the purpose of attending to the duties of his appointment...

1. All applicants for relief under the Act of the Assembly for relief of indigent families of soldiers, must file with the Commissioner a certificate signed by the nearest Magistrate or by the School Committee of her district, setting forth that the applicant is in indigent circumstances...

2. Persons who live in their parents families and who have not more than 1 child, cannot be considered in "indigent circumstances" except in cases where the parents are not able to support themselves and their children.

3. Persons living with their parents or friends who are able to give them their board without charge, cannot be considered "indigent" in the meaning of the Law.

4. The following allowances will be made to those who present the proper certificates. For every soldier's wife or mother in "indigent circumstances" \$2 per month for herself and \$1 monthly for every child under 10 years of age.

5. That the Commissioner keep a list of purchases; from whom made; in what quantity; and at what price, and publish the same monthly.

6. The Commissioner is instructed to appoint some responsible person in each School District to receive and carry to the district for every proper applicant, such provisions or money as they may be entitled to under the law.

7. The Commissioner will make every effort to purchase provisions for the soldiers' families to be sold at cost or given to proper applicants when necessary, and it is hoped that every citizen will feel it to be his duty to sell any provisions he may have to spare to the Commissioner...

8. The Commissioner earnestly requests all who have provisions to spare, to sell to him, that he may be able to provide for the wants of the families of our soldiers. He also hopes that all will come up promptly on the days above mentioned and be sure to bring their certificates without which they cannot draw.
