At a Convention of the North Carolina troops in the army of Northern Virginia, assembled at Orange Court House, Va., at 11 o'clock a. m., on the 12th August, 1863, Col. Brysn Grimes, 4th N. C. T., upon motion of Capt. J. C. Turner, 6th N. C. T., was called to the chair, who explained the object of the meeting in a few remarks.

Upon motion of Col. Bennett, 14th Regiment, all officers and men from North Carolina, present, were invited to take seats in the Convention, and act as delegates from their respective commands.

Upon motion of Gol Garrett, 5th Regiment, a committee of one from each Briggade was appointed to draft resolutions for the action of the Convention, to be selected by the delegates from the respective Brigades.

At 8 o'clock the Convention re-assembled and was called to order by the President. The committee not being ready to report, La Col H C Jones, Col Bennett, Col Coz and Capt Gales responded to calls made upon them, in brief and

eloquent speeches. The committee on resolutions then made their report, through their Chairman, Col Garrett, who read the following resolutions, which were, on motion of Capt scriatum:

Resolved. That our separation from the Northern Government was, from the beginning. intended to be final and eternal. For this have we suffered and endured much ; for this have so many of our comrades fallen, and for this do we still intend to endure all and every ill; nor do we intend that the action of any portion of our people at home shall so bind our hands as to make further resistance on our part impossible. That we are daily confirmed in our determination by the unnatural teachings of the Northern press, by the innane and fanatical nets of the Northern people, by the inhuman and unprincipled acts of the Northern Government, the crowning one of which is shown in the late proclamation of Lincoln, threatening retaliation on our soldiery for our treatment of slaves found in insurrection, and by the insumerable acts of savage barbarity of the Northern soldiery in every part of our land.

Resolved. That earnestly as we desire peace and long for a return of its blessings, we do ut-Lt & P Hill, on H, 6th Regt, Caswell county. tending to a peace upon the basis of reconstruc-

enty. tion or submission; and that, while we are and have always been, surious for un honorable settlement of our difficulties, the agitation of netriement of our difficulties, the subject on any other terms than our perfect, independence of Northern rule is in the later of the good people of North Carolina, interests of the good people of North Carolina, interests of the good people of North Carolina. Nor can we comprehend the base feeling that would groupt a return to the embances of an enemy, who has carried as a wer of invasion against us for more than two years, coupled with every savage infliction which he has had the power to impose, culminating is the employment of our slaves and the free negroes of the North to murder our citizens and oppose us

in monorable combat as soldiers.

Resolved, That while the soldiers are fighting, suffering and dying for our independence, it is wrong that some at home should be continually dampening their arter, costing a chill and gloom on their hopes and unverving them for the centest by untimely repinings and base leanings toward submission; that we would be teanings toward submission; that we would be untrue to our principles, untrue to our wives and children, who would be the greatest sufferers by submission, untrue to our noble dead, untrue to our interests, untrue to our State, untrue to our Confederacy, and watrue to the cause of freedom, now to submit to the domina-tion of such as rule the Northern people, and that we fear their rule more than we fear their

wrath. Resolved, That we have learned with deep mortification and regret that several meetings of citizens have been held in North Carelina, in which resolutions have been adopted declaring opposition to the further enforcement of the conscript law in our State; that we cannot regard such action, taken by a portion of our people, in any other light than as favoring the cause of our enemies, with whom we are coutending, and in this point of view as disloyal, and to us who have been relying upon those at home for support and sympaty, as treacherous in the extreme; that we cannot regard the uppointment of an obnoxious tithingman, or the future of the other States to do their duty patriotically, as any excuse for North Carolina to refuse to perform theirs in any respect; that the alleging such un excuse shows that they do not plead any inability to comply with the requirements of the law, but that it is a species of chatting hypocricy, employed by those who desire to escape the dangers and hardships of the

WH.F. Resolved, That the course of the Raleigh Standard and its supporters in North Carolin in encouraging this spirit among our people meets with our unqualified condemnation, and we denounce the statement of the editor of that paper that his course is approved by a large majority of the troops from North Carolina, as utterly false, and that for the fair fame und reputation of North Curolina, we sincerely hope that no such statement will be reiterated.

Resolved, That is a struggle of the charm ter in which we are engaged, involving as it does the preservation or destruction of all our rights as freemen the freedonr of the press, does not demand that any sentiments, however treasonable, may be uttered with impunity; ated government, is and should be restricted within such limits sa to forbid this; and if should be found that true patriotism in North Carolina had so far lost its hold upon the minds and hearts of her people as to be unable to check the course of the Standard and other papers who are giving utterance to such sentiments, then the public amborities would be recreant to the cause of the country, if they should fail to take measures for their suppress-

Resolved. That we heartily approve of the goble and patriotic course of Gov. Vance in this struggle for our independence; that we willingly confide the honor and integrity of our State in his hands, and that we are certain he will

not betray his trust.

Resolved, That while the resolutions adopted show truly the sentiments of the Convention upon all the points embraced in them, inasmuch as it is impossible in this form to em-Body all that the Convention and those whom they represent desire should be said to the people of our State, with the arguments and considerations which might be brought forward to sustain them, the President of the Convention be authorized to appoint a committee of seven members of the Convention, who shall be entrusted with the proparation and publica-tion of an address to the people of the State, specially appealing to the good and the patriot-ic to rise in their might and put down the small (as we believe,) but treasonable faction in their midst, whose machinations we have more trouble to regist than the power of our enemies.

The resolutions were unanimously and enthusiastically adopted. Pending their adoption, remarks were submitted by Col. Garrett, Col Bennet, Lieut-Col Jones, Capt Bird and Lt Hill,

Capt R W York, 6th regiment, responded to calls and entertained the Conven-Bird, 11th Regement, read and adopted tion in an eloquent address, and handling the traitors and reconstructionists without gloves. The speaker was frequently interrupted by the enthusiastic applause of the Convention.

Under the 8th resolution the Chairma appointed Col T M Garrett, 5th regiment; Col John D Barry, 18th regiment; Lt-Col H C Jones, 57th regiment; Dr F Hardy, 6th regiment; Lieut S P Hill, 6th regiment; Capt Seaton Gales, A A G Ramseur's brigade; and ou motion Col Bryan Grimes, 4th regiment, was added to the committee.

Upon motion of Dr J F Miller, 34th regiment, the proceedings of the Convention were ordered to be published in the North Carolina and Richmond papers; and by motion of Dr W W Gaither, 26th to be prepared by the Committee appoints of regiment, the proceedings, with the address

The officers and members of Captain Reilly's and Latham's Batteries, N. C. Troops, determined to hold a meeting on the 19th of August, in regard to the action of the Raleigh Standard, at the time appointed there was quite a large ussemblage present, as the strength of the two Batteries is between three and four hundred men.

On motion of Captain James Reilly, Captain A C Latham was called upon to act as Chairman. Captain Lathum on taking the Chair, made a few pert remarks, explaining the ob-ject of the meeting, in a clear and lucid man-

On Motion of Lieutenant Myers, Lieutenant Woodward was requested to act as Secretary. On motion of Lieutenant Myers, the Chairman was requested to appoint a committee of sixteen, to draft Resolutions to be submitted to the meeting. The Chairman appointed the fol-

After the committee retired, the action of the Standard was discussed at length, in a manuer very uncomplimentary to its conductor. In bout an hour the committee returned, and reported through their chairman, Capt Reilly, that they had performed the task assigned them; that this inestimable right in every well regu- whereupon, the resolutions were called for, and were fend by Lient Ramsay as follows :

Whereas, it is with the greatest regret we, far from home, and every thing we hold near and dear, find ourselves under the necessity of giving utterance to our feelings, in regard to certain civilians of our State, whose course and action should fill the heart of every good citizen with the greatest contempt and indignation-

Resolved 1st. That the present course of the Stundardgand its satellite and protege the Progress, (papers published in Ruleigh,) are at variunce with our feelings, and, in our estimation, merits our supreme disgust and indignation

2d. That though we have been separated for more than two years from home, and those for whose welfare, our hearts most earnessly yearn, and suffering the greatest privations and toile, yet we cannot and will not entertain the idea of reconstruction in any form; and prefer to spend the remainder of our days exposed to the storms of battle, to crouching at the feet of Vankee oppressors.

3d. That we cornectly entreat every citizen of the old North State to spara from their presence as rule traitors every one who entertains the idea of reconstruction in any form ; and not allow a few exempts and conscripts, to disturb affairs of State, as their only deeire is to skulk from duty, at this time of danger to our conn try. But we ask the officers of the State to assist the officers of the Confederate States in placing every delinquent in the field, where he may do his daty.

4th. That we earnestly desire peace, but cannot consent to say, except a final separation, which will make us free, forever free, from our oppressors.

5th That in our present Governor, 2 B Vance, we find an eminent statesman and patriotic leader, in whose zeal, integrity and ability, we have the greatest confidence. And whose able management of the affairs of State merit our unquatified approbation.

6th. That we earnestly entreat every citizen of the State, to bend their energies to the atmost, to support and increase the Confeder are armies, so that with the favor of the great Governon of Nations, we may be able to wrest from treacherous enemies a speedy and lasting peace, which shall free us forever from their power and influence.

After the resolutions were read, the Chairman announced that they were open for discussion. But it seemed that no one had any thing to say unfavorable to their reception They were adopted by agelamation, and if the Standard man and his friends had been present and heard the ready and oncerful endorsement of the resolutions by those war-worn, yet stern, and determined spirits, they would have forgots. ten the terror of the Yankees, and looked at those forced to be their opposite at home.

On motion of Lieut Myers, the proceedings

fended us, therefore, Resolved, That while we have always been auxious for peace upon such terms as would secure our Rights, Liberty and Independence, yet we denounce the several meetings that have been held as disgraceful to the State and subversive of all the dearest rights for which we are contending.

Resolved. That the courses pursued by W. W. Holden, Editor of the Raleigh Standard, in encouraging such meetings, s damaging seriously our struggle for Independence, and is sowing discord among our soldiers, thereby causing dissatisfaction and desertion.

Resolved. That his press is a nuisance to the State and ought to be suppressed. Resolved. That every loyal citizen ought to look more upon our country's cause, and denounce as a traitor every man who does not seek his country's glory and his country's good.

Resolved. That the scheme of clubbing adopted by his followers to scatter his paper throughout the State is a species of villainy that ought to be denounced, and that we will give our support to no member of such "club," for we regard them as disloyal to the Confederate Government.

Resolved. That we assure our brave soldiers that we have entire confidence in their loyalty, as the past will prove, and we urge them to reject the vile, wilful perversions of truth as set forth by the "Stan-

Resolved. That we cordially endorse the administration of our worthy Governor, Z. B. Vance, and that he be urged to rememper that a " man cannot take fire in his bosom and his clothes not be burned."

Resolved, That we appeal to our patriotic Governor to use all his influence and power in forwarding reinforcements to the army, and in arresting deserters and returning them to the same, to all of which we pledge our support and influence. Resolved, That we approve and endorse

MAJ. J. McLEOD TURNER.

The many friends of Major J. McLeod Turner (who was reported mortally wounded in the last charge on the enemy's works at Gettysburg, then in command of the 7th Regiment, N. C. T.,) will be pleased to learn that by letters received by flag of truce, that though terribly wounded strong hopes are entertained of his recovery.

The letters states that he was wounded by a minuie ball entering his right side and passing out on his left. He had previously received a flesh wound in the leg while leading his regiment to the charge, and but for his andaunted bravery and self-eacrificing devotion to the noble 7th, Major Turner in all probability would not have received the last dreadful wound; for instead of leaving the field on receiving the first wound, he walked the entire length of the regiment to give up the command and place it in charge of the officer next in rank, having done so be was returning when struck down by a minnie ball, passing through him. He was borne a short distance from the enemy's works; his condition not permitting him being carried from the field. He requested to be laid in a ditch near by and desired the men who bore him off to leave him. and go to their regiment, saying every man was required at his post. So he was left. Our forces soon after retiring, and thinking he was dying, Maj. Turner gave his watch and other valuables about his person to a soldier who was, passing, with the request that they should be taken to his mother. The soldier may have failen, or be a prisoner, as the sacred request
