TERRIBLE COLLIERY EXPLOSION AT THE CLOVER HILL MINES.

SIXTY NINE LIVES LOST.

The following paragraphs in relation to the terrible explosion which took place at the Clover Hill Mines, near Richmond, on Wednesday last, are taken from the detailed reports, published in the Richmond Dispatch.

BRIGHT HOPE MINE.

Bright Hope Mine, opened in 1867, by the Clover Hill Railroad Company, has two shafts, about 800 feet in depth, and it extends north and south about 3500 feet. In 1859 an explosion took place in this mine which resulted in the death of nine men.
