From midnight until two, the rays which it slowly shot up, alternately appearing and disappearing, began to move with great activity like the play of what is called heat lightning in summer; sometimes breaking up into stationary nebulas, then dispersing and radiating as before.—ib.

Latest from Europe.—We have English dates to the 19th March, inclusive. They contain no political intelligence of interest here. Liverpool Cotton Market, March 16.—We have had a brisk market to day, the sales amounting to 5,000 bags, two thirds taken by the trade, and the remainder by speculators. There is no alteration in prices, the late advance being steadily maintained.
