





SECOND COMPTROLLER'S OF. FICE, September 1836.

The Agent for puying Pensions at Sin: In order to guard more effectially against a repetition of frauds. as here fore practised by the production of furged papers, the first three following addition rples will be observed by the accounts officers of the Treasury.

1. In every case where the pension employs an attorney to receive his pra sion, the execution of the power math in the presence of at least one winey other than the megistrate before whom is acknowledged. No payment to sea torney will be allowed unless supported by a voucher thus executed.

2. In all case- where the signature, the pensioner or his attorney is required such pensioner or attorney will writin name at length, if capable of so damp otherwise, his signature may be by nor or cross, in which case the execution mat be in the presence of at least one coup-tent witness, other than the justice oras

tary who acts officially in the case. 3. No payments will in future be and to any peasioner, either in person of by attorney, who has not applied for hispa-sion for more than one year, without a production of evidence of his identity, a prescribed in the instructions from the office of June 10, 1833, chapter i, section 2, and form B, nor antil such evidence has been transmitted to the Commission of Pensions, and a special direction as thorizing the payment has been given. 4 In case where a certificate has been issued by the Commissioner of Pension to the widow or children of an officers: soldier under the act of June 7, 183., of under the act of May 15, 1828, no proof the relationship of the applicant to the decensed officer or soldier is to be required by the pension agent, that proof having been necessarily filed in the office of the Comms-io-er of Pensions prior to the issting of such certificate.


