CIRCULAR.

Treasury Department, SECOND COMPTROLLER'S OF. FICE, September 1836.

The Agent for paying Pensions at Sin: In order to guard more effectively against a repetition of frauds, as bree, fore practised by the production of lage papers, the first three following milities rules will be observed by the account officers of the Treasury.

1. In every case where the pension coploys an attorney to receive his p sion, the execution of the power may in the presence of at least one aim other than the magistrate before whom is acknowledged. No payment to according will be allowed unless supported a voucher thus executed.

2. In all cases where the signature the pensioner or his attorney is require such pensioner or attorney will write name at length, if capable of so day otherwise, his signature may be by ma or cross, in which case the execution no be in the presence of at least one comptent witness, other than the justice ora tary who acts officially in the case 3. No payments will in future be ma to any pensioner, either in person of

attorney, who has not applied for his per ion for more than one year, without production of evidence of his identity, prescribed in the instructions from the offic of June 10, 1833, chapter l, sedin 2, and form B, nor until such evident has been transmitted to the Commission of Pensions, and a special direction to thorizing the payment has been given. 4. In case where a certificate has be is ned by the Commissioner of Pens

to the widow or children of an officerar soldier under the act of June 7, 1831, or under the act of May 13, 1828, no proofs the relationship of the applicant to the d ceased officer or soldier is to be require by the pension agent, that proof hour been necessarily filed in the office of the Commssioner of Pensions prior to the a suing of such certificate.
