CONGRESS.

After a great deal of hesitation, the body of Federalism in the house (wnich achieved such a triumph in the passage of the Bankrupt bill, for the relief of the country,) came forward to-day, and by a vote acknowledged that they had made a principle, and the spirit of the Constitution, in that act, which expunged the oblithe sentiment of revolt among their counoffspring to save themselves. They are the people, with the burden of the bank rupt act upon them. They have done enough already by it, to secure the allegicharge their debts by political service. This class of the Federal trained bands being satisfied, the repeal is intended, we suppose, as an oblation to the sounder portion of the party, to induce them to renew their fealty to the old political leaders who thus play fast and loose with the most sacred principles of morals and politics. This extraordinary law of the extraordinary session was repealed to-day by a vote of nearly two to one.

[The bill contains a proviso that this re peal shall not extend to or affect any case which at the time this Act goes into effect shall be pending before any Court, nor to any proceeding which at said time shall have been legally commenced, and which shall be then in progress, and under way, by virtue of the Act hereby repealed.]
