To Builders.

THE Commissioners appointed to contract for, and to superintend the **Building of a New Jail,**
In this place, will receive proposals until the 25th of July next, for a BRICK building of the following dimensions: 36 feet long by 27 feet wide, two stories, the wall about 22 feet high, 32 inches thick of brick to the first floor and the balance 20 inches thick of brick—to be well secured with suitable timber, spikes and iron—a ten foot passage and two dungeons on the first floor, and three rooms above—the roof to be covered with slate, or some fire-proof material, as the Commissioners and Contractor may agree. As the Commissioners are authorized to make their contract publicly or privately, and to change or alter the dimensions of the building as they may think best for the interest of the county, it would be well for those wishing to take the contract to be present in this place on the 25th of July. The building will be required to be finished by November Court, 1845, in a workmanlike manner. Bond and security will be required for the faithful compliance of the contract.
