Mr. Shepard's Reply.

RALEIGH, N. C., Tuesday, March 17th, 1846.

GENTLEMEN: Your letter informing me of my nomination as the democratic candidate for Governor of North Carolina, has been received. In January last, when in Newbern, I received a letter from a friend requesting me to accept such a nomination. To that request I returned a prompt and decided negative; on two occasions subsequent (as some of the Committee well know) I desired that my name might not be connected in any manner with the distinguished office of Governor: but being since privately and publicly called on and now urgently solicited (by the Committee appointed by the late Convention to act for the party) to become the standard bearer of our noble principles, I cannot longer hesitate. I accept therefore, the nomination so cordially and politely tendered, and shall use every exertion to defeat the policy and measures of the Federal party.

It is entirely unnecessary at this time to mention my views on any subject of State or National interest, as they may be familiar to every section of the Commonwealth. With zeal, activity, and energy, we can & will be triumphant; and here permit me to congratulate the Democracy upon the success of all the leading measures of the administration. The admission of Texas into our glorious Union and the adjustment of the Tariff, upon equitable principles, during the present session of Congress, cannot fail to redound to the honor of the Democratic party. On the currency, the controversy concerning Oregon, questions of State policy, and indeed all others, I deem it quite useless now to expatiate, because they will be examined at length in my discussions before the people. HYDE COUNTY.

A portion of the Whigs of Hyde held a Meeting on the 24th of last month, at which David Carter, Esq., formerly of this City, was nominated for the Senate, and Mr. Thomas R. Gibbs for the office of Sheriff! Mr. Stanly was present, and consented to close the exercises of the Meeting with "a few remarks." We quote as follows from the official proceedings: "While the committee were absent, deliberating on the matters confided to them, Messrs. Satterthwaite and Donnell were

called on and gave impressive and able speeches which were frequently applauded. And, afterwards, Mr. Wynne (already favorably known as an effective minister of the Methodist church,) being called on, from all sides of the house, entertained and delighted the audience with his eloquence and humor."

A writer in the North State Whig, who signs himself "W***" (very probably the above "Minister" so "favorably known") abuses us roundly for having protested against this effort on the part of the Whigs to make judicial officers subservient to party spirit; but that writer must come down from his stilts and become not only more decent, but less topknotical, before we can seriously notice him.

Both the North State Whig and the Newbernian speak of the "good feeling" which prevailed in this Meeting; and perhaps they speak truly so far as that Meeting is concerned, for it seems to have been not only a party but a family concern all round. Mr. Wynne, makes an "effective" speech in favor of his relation, Mr. Thos. R. Gibbs, for Sheriff; Mr. Carter, who is also, we believe, in the family, is nominated by the same Meeting for the Senate; while Mr. Zachariah Gibbs and two of the Spencers also take part in this laudable attempt to manage the affairs of the people of Hyde County. All these gentlemen, we are inclined to think, are related to each other by marriage or by blood. And who were the leaders in the Meeting? Lawyers from other Counties—Mr. Stanly from Beaufort, and Mr. Donnell from Craven! Will the people of Hyde sanction such a thing? Will they turn out a good Sheriff, to put in any man thus brought forward?

Will they be the first to set the example to the State of interfering with the political opinions of their Sheriff? We hope not. Let them stand like men upon their rights, and resist, now and hereafter, all attempts by selfish and interested men to dictate to them how they shall vote.

DEMOCRATIC MEETING IN MARTIN.

At a large and highly respectable meeting of the democratic party in the ninth district of Martin county, assembled at the office of Dr. Abner Williams, on the 7th day of March, 1846; Dr. George Cobb was called to the chair, and Benjamin C. Mayo was appointed Secretary.

On motion of Dr. A. Williams, a committee of six was appointed to draft resolutions for the action of the meeting. The committee, through Dr. Williams, presented the following preamble and resolutions, which were received by acclamation, and adopted without a dissenting voice:

Whereas it is deemed expedient by the republicans of Martin county to hold a County Convention, in the town of Williamston, on the 14th day of April next, for the purpose of nominating candidates for the Legislature; and in as much as that Convention meets with the cordial approbation of the republicans in the ninth district of Martin county: Therefore

Resolved, That the Chairman of this meeting appoint five delegates to represent the democracy of the ninth district in said Convention.

Resolved, That we will use all honorable means to procure the election of the nominees of the democratic Convention.

Resolved, further, That we have full faith in the ability and patriotism of Col. Asa Biggs, our present Representative in Congress.

Resolved, That we have learned with regret that Green W. Caldwell, the democratic nominee for the gubernatorial chair, has declined to accept; that Col. Asa Biggs, our distinguished, patriotic, and talented countyman, is a fit and suitable person for that office, and that we recommend him to the favorable notice of the "unterrified democracy" of North Carolina.

Resolved, That we have unabated confidence in the wisdom and patriotism of our present Chief Magistrate of the nation; and when the democracy are "asked for their jewels," they can with pride and honor point to James Knox Polk.

Resolved, That, standing upon the same ramparts occupied by the republicans during the administration of Martin Van Buren, we are now, as then, opposed to a National Bank, either to furnish a currency or "regulate exchanges;" that we are in favor of an independent Treasury, with the specie clause; that we are opposed to the distribution of the proceeds of the sales of the public lands, or any other public property, among the States; and likewise to the assumption of the State debts by the General Government.

Resolved, That William W. Holden, Editor of The North Carolina Standard, is entitled to our thanks for his patriotic and efficient support of the principles of his party.

The Chairman appointed the following delegates in accordance with the first resolution, viz: Capt. W. R. Sherwood, B. C. Mayo, Esq., E. Hyman, Z. R. Brown and N. F. Hooker.

Resolved, That these proceedings be signed by the Chairman and Secretary, and published in the North Carolina Standard. GEORGE COBB, Chm'n. B. C. MAYO, Sec'y.

Suicide of Com. Crane.—We regret to learn, that Com. Wm. H. Crane, of the United States Navy, committed suicide in his room at the Navy Department in Washington, on Wednesday, by cutting his throat with a razor. For several days previous he was impressed with the belief that he was about to die, and while laboring under this mental hallucination, committed the rash deed. He was 62 years of age, and highly respected by his brother officers.

Presentiment of death.—Lieut. John C. Henry, who died in Philadelphia last week, had, three weeks prior to his death, a presentiment that he would be called hence on his birth day, and at that time made it known to his mother, who tried in vain to drive the idea from his mind. On Wednesday morning last she said to him, "Well, John, this is your birth day, and you are still in the land of the living." "Yes," he replied, "but before it is over I shall be numbered with the dead." This remark proved to be prophetic, for during the evening of the same day he calmly breathed his last while seated on a chair before the fire in his chamber.—ib.

Hon. Thomas Stockton, Governor of the State of Delaware, died very suddenly at New Castle on the evening of the 2nd inst. Whilst in one of the public offices, without any premonition of his approaching end, his head fell suddenly upon his breast, and he died without a struggle or a groan. A rupture of some of the large blood vessels in the vicinity of the heart, is supposed by the physicians to have been the cause of his death. His general health and spirits for some time previous had been remarkably good. His gubernatorial term of service would not have expired until January, 1849.—ib.

Poisoned by Iacofoca Matches.—We regret to state that a little son of Capt. Jas. P. Williamson, in this vicinity, was poisoned a few days since, by chewing a box in which there had been Iacofoca matches. He died in a very few hours. Clarksville, Va. Herald.
