Supreme Court.

This tribunal adjourned on Friday, 30th ult. after a protracted session of three months, during which time Opinions were delivered in one hundred cases. Among the closing Opinions was the following:

By Ruffin, C. J., In den ex dem. Battle vs. Speight, from Edgecombe, reversing the judgment and directing a venire de novo.

This case involves property to the amount of ten or twelve thousand dollars, of the estate of the late Col. Wilson, acquired subsequent to making his will. The Court below decided in favor of the county, but the Supreme Court reversed that decision, and has granted a new trial.

Democratic Meeting in Wake.—At a large and respectable meeting of the Democratic party, held on the 3d instant in the Town Hall in Raleigh, on motion of R. N. Jeffreys, Mr. B. B. Smith was called to the Chair, and Isaac H. Rogers appointed Secretary.

On motion of G. E. B. Singeltary, the Chairman appointed a Committee to report Resolutions for the action of the meeting. The Committee, consisting of Messrs. Singeltary, J. G. Jeffreys, and Benj. Marriott, having retired for consultation, in their absence Maj. Clark, who was called on, entertained the meeting with a handsome Speech.

The Committee reported the following Resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That we do not consider that sufficient notice has been given of the present meeting; and do therefore invite our fellow citizens of Wake County to attend a Meeting, to be held on Monday of May Court next, to consider the propriety of sending Delegates to a Convention to nominate a candidate for Congress in this District.

On motion, the meeting adjourned.

Eighth Congressional District.—We learn from a Circular of the Hon. Richard S. Donnell, published in the last Washington Whig, that that gentleman declines a re-election to Congress. The Whig calls upon its party in that District to hold its primary meetings and nominate a successor to Mr. Donnell, but it is one thing to nominate, and another to elect. At the last election, our readers will remember,

The Portsmouth Chronicle of the 13th February says: "Among the recent appointments and promotions by the President, with the approval of the Senate, we are pleased to see that of First Lieut. Henry B. Watson, of the Marine Corps, to be Captain by brevet, from the 20th of November, 1847, for gallant and meritorious conduct in the battles of the 8th and 9th of January, 1847, on the banks of the Rio San Gabriel, on the plains of Mesa, in California, and for the defence of Guayamas from the 20th of October to the 20th of November, 1847."—ib.

Mutual Insurance Company.—Mr. John C. Patridge has been unanimously elected by the Directors as Secretary to the North Carolina Mutual Insurance Company, in place of Mr. James F. Jordan, resigned. Mr. Jordan has accepted the appointment of Secretary to the North Carolina Mutual Life Insurance Company.

We take occasion to call the attention of the members of the Company to the advertisement of the Secretary, in relation to the assessment of five per cent. on the premium notes, declared in January last. These assessments, it will be seen, are required to be paid on or before the first day of May next; and it is important to the operations of the Company, in whose continued usefulness and prosperity every member feels an interest, that this requisition should be promptly complied with.—ib.

North Carolina Applicants.—Messrs. Stanly and Barringer are both applicants for the mission to Spain. Although the appointment of Mr. Barringer would prove more acceptable to the whole people of the State than that of Stanly, yet, as the Whig members of the Legislature, before the adjournment, recommended the latter for a foreign mission, he will probably be the successful candidate, should Mr. Mangum hand in the resignation of Mr. Saunders.—Lincoln Republican.

What will Mr. Mangum do? He we have heard it suggested, would like to go to Spain; and the probability is, after all, that he will be the lucky individual. At any rate between so many expectants the mission is in a fair way to be filled; and as Gen. Taylor has "no friends to reward," of course a Whig will be appointed.—ib.

Our University.—We are much gratified to learn that Ex-Governor Graham will deliver the annual Oration before the two Literary Societies of the University, at the approaching Commencement.

The Rev. C. F. M. Deems, former adjunct Professor of Latin Literature, will deliver the Valedictory sermon to the graduating Class.

A brilliant Commencement is anticipated, and we hope that it may be numerously attended. Nothing contributes so much to the incitements to labor on the part of the Students as the presence of friends, and the favoring countenance of the Public; while nothing certainly is more productive of good feeling, in these days of party strife, than such periodical communions of the friends of literature and science.—Raleigh Register.

Reward.—Gov. Manly has offered a reward of \$300 for Nathaniel H. Simpson and Andrew F. Gibson, who have left the State, being charged by the Grand Jury of Guilford county with stealing a negro slave named Bob, the property of one Ludwick Summers.—Newbern Republican.

Connecticut Elections.—Democratic Triumph.—The election held in this State on Monday last has resulted in favor of the Democrats, and in a signal rebuke to Whiggery and Taylorism. The Democrats have elected three out of the four members for Congress and the Whigs only one.—ib.

No choice for State officers. House Democratic—Senate doubtful.

As the election of Governor goes to the Legislature in case of no choice by the people, this result is tantamount to the election of Col. Seymour, Democrat.

Rhode Island.—The election in this State was held on Wednesday last. The representation in Congress remains the same as during last session, one Whig, and one Democrat. From the meagre returns received, we conclude that the Democrats have made considerable gains on the popular vote.

The Plank Road.—The Fayetteville Carolinian, announces that the full amount of individual subscription of \$80,000 to the Plank road from that place to Salisbury may be considered as secured.—ib.

Bank of Fayetteville.—The Fayetteville Carolinian says, the requisite amount has been subscribed to this Bank, and it is presumed that it will be put in operation at an early day. Fayetteville and Washington have contributed nearly the whole of the subscription, thirteen thousand dollars having been subscribed at the latter place.—ib.

We have omitted to mention that two new vessels have been recently built here—the Schr. Wave, and the Brig Buena Vista. The Wave was built by Paul Cornell for John & B. M. Selby. This is the 4th vessel built by Mr. Cornell. She shows the thorough workmanship and fine finish for which he is distinguished as a ship builder.

The Buena Vista was built by Joseph Farrow for Geo. R. Dixon and Capt. Amos Ireland. She is a splendid vessel for her class, thoroughly built, of the best materials, and perfectly finish throughout. Her cabin is one of the neatest we ever saw, and was finished by Mr. Gordon, of this place. She sailed a few days ago for Philadelphia, carrying besides other freight, 100,000 feet lumber.—Prosperous gales attend her.—Washington Whig.

Foreign.

The steamer Niagara, has arrived at Halifax, Nova Scotia, with Liverpool dates to the 26th ult. The Peterburg Republican says: The commercial advices has had quite a depressing influence on the market, and are not altogether satisfactory.—American stocks are said to have fully sustained the previous prices. The sales of cotton, however, had not been as large as during the preceding two weeks, and the rates were lower, though on the improvement at the close.

Wilmington Market.—April 5. Bacon.—No change in prices of North Carolina Bacon since our last report; market well supplied, and sales only effected in small parcels at quotations. We hear of one lot of about 2,000 lbs. hog round, having been disposed of at 8 cents per lb. Corn.—No arrivals since last report. The market is well supplied; our figures represent last sales. Meal is worth from 55 to 60 cts.

Lard.—There is a heavy stock of North Carolina lard on the market. Small sales, in lots to suit, at 7 1/2c. per lb. for bbls., and 8c. for kegs.

Naval Stores.—The late freshet has brought to market a considerable quantity of Turpentine and Tar. The sales of Turpentine since last report have reached about 16,300 barrels, the bulk of which has changed hands at \$2 1/2 for soft, and \$1 1/2 for hard—a decline of 1/2 cents since last report. The sales this morning were rather better, having been effected at \$2 1/5 for soft, and \$1 1/5 a \$1 20 for hard. We quote at the closing rates.
