WASHINGTON LETTER.
 (From Our Regular Correspondent.)
 WASHINGTON, D. C., June 6, 1890.
 The republicans in congress are much kept up just now over the public business committed to their charge and they are not by any means a happy family. They are now realizing that the control of the government involves responsibilities and compels something more than a mere distribution of spoils in the shape of good offices. Not long since it was given out with a great flourish of trumpets that the great ability of Reed as a presiding officer, coupled with the cast iron rules by which the minority opposition could be successfully throttled, would enable an early adjournment of congress. Nay, that congress would be forced to leave town by the first of July as all the public business would be completed and there would be nothing for it to do. A different tune is sung now. Congress will not get away by August in the gossip heard, and even this depends upon certain contingencies, and involves a transfer of the tariff question until next session, or a tilt after the fall elections. The excuse for this is that the senate needs a long time in which to prepare and consider a tariff bill, it being generally conceded that the higher legislative body will so puncture the McKinley bill that it can never be recognized by its best friends. This is a peculiar attitude for a republican house to assume, anyhow, as in times past the power of the senate to even change a revenue bill has been questioned, the Constitution placing this question essentially under the jurisdiction of the house, where all such measures must originate, and here we have not a single erratic individual, but almost every mother's son of the republicans looking with wistful eyes to the senate not only to evade what they have declared to be a constitutional inhibition, but to do that which they had not the moral courage themselves to do, frame a just and honest tariff bill upon just and honest principles and which will be a blessing instead of a burden to the people of the country.
 But the tariff is not the only subject upon which the republicans are like the national election law is to other things like the mischievous. This is the one thing they want most but are dubious about getting, as it is kind of look in upon a part of a budget of value. Indeed, the fear is that amount that a gain of this kind might be covered by the opposite political organization, and then, like the enfranchisement of the negro, it might help well on the democratic body. The republicans have never forgiven themselves for giving the south the increased political representation through the negro's enfranchisement. The result is that they are doctored about the Lodge election bill and stumble over the provisions of Rawl's measure, until possibly, this will be another political subject relegated to the senate for determination.
 The pension matter is, too, a most bothersome one and the difficulty is rendered doubly difficult because the senate is out with the house on this question and no help can be expected from that quarter except upon the basis of a humiliating surrender. The house wants a service pension, or at least claims that it does, while the senate does not believe in supporting themselves. Hence, the senate of both parties spend the last dollar to care for disabled veterans and their dependent families, but let the healthy men look out for themselves a while longer.
 There are some of the difficulties now encountered by the republicans in this session, which was to be illustrious in legislative annals for the expenditure of public business, not to mention the silver question, and it is now clearly apparent that there is not plain sailing ahead. But while it is far from the present outlook, will not go "riding down the stream" as the congressional observers say, its notoriety as a surplus spender and treasury grabber will be sufficient to give it a reputation, although it "unwet, unwhorred, and unwhanged."
 Much has been said about a southern claims and they have been held up before northern audiences at political gatherings as a rag held up before a hall in the arena to infuriate them. But it often happens that a glimpse of misery is encountered when looking over these relics of the war, as the following incident will show.
 When the war opened one of the largest wholesale houses in Nashville, Tennessee, was conducted by Payne, James and Barnes. The federal army came and wanted the building occupied by these merchants for military purposes, and

they were evicted. Three times the government sent a military necessity for the quarters, after business had begun, under persistent eviction they were ruined. Their losses were a million. Witness the sequel; Buckner H. Payne died in an almshouse at Nashville. Robert A. Barnes, died at Nashville. John A. Payne, leaving a widow who is now gaining living by her needle, and John D. James, is now an old man in poor circumstances living in Orange County, California.
 Does it not seem reasonable that these people have some claim against the government, even if it is a southern claim?
 The lobby which is working up the return of the twenty millions involved in the district tax of 1861 to the states and to themselves have got out of heart at the prospect.
 Some of these fellows, have been working on a contingency of twenty five per cent, and they now see a handsome fortune beautifully slipping through their fingers. So much money has been appropriated among the members for public buildings and the like that little more than a starvation diet is left for the lobby.
