

SIMPLE LOG JACK. Very Useful to Farmers Living in a Tim

bered Country. The illustration, which we reengrave from Farm and Home, represents a log jack which any ingenious farmer can make. It consists of two hard wood planks nailed quite close together. Holes are then drilled, in which two iron pegs should slide easily. A lever of hard, tough wood, or of iron, is then required with a short chain and hook A chain is then hooked to the top of



the plank, passed under the log to be raised and booked to the chain on the lever. The lever is then worked sim-ilarly to a pump handle. When low-ering the handle and allowing the weight to rest on the outer pin, move up the pin in front to a hole higher. When the handle is raised with the weight on the front pin, raise the back pin. By this plan a ton may be easily raised by a single person, as the leverage is only half an inch with a 6-foot

FACTS FOR FARMERS.

GREEN soiling is one of the most direct methods of increasing the capacity of the farm, so far as the amount of stock to be carried is concerned. WHEN feeding milch cows, feed for all the product that can possibly be obtained. This means a liberal grain ration, in addition to the best hay. THE wise dairyman always looks to what is best for the cow, for in the end he knows that such management will prove best for him.-N. E. Farmer. CREAM sometimes becomes bitter if raised in pans at a temperature too low for the milk to sour. Milk in pans should be sour in thirty-six hours.



An inch strip must be placed upon the hind cross piece to bring it up to a level with the one in front of the hind wheel. The cross pieces are now high enough so that when the boards are placed upon them they will be out of the way of the wheel. This makes a rack which is nearly level, being only inches higher behind than in front This rack is advantageous in that the distance between the sills is smaller at the front end than at the rear end of the rack, thus allowing shorter turns



order to keep the rack in place a false bolster is bolted to it which, fits on to the front bolster of the wagon. The false bolster is made of hard wood. In front the sills are 10% inches apart from outside to outside, the distance at the other end being 30 inches. ROTATION OF CROPS. Composition of Soils and Way to Main-tain Their Fertility. As the result of the analyses of 150 samples of soils, the Minnesota station has issued a bulletin of which the fol-

has issued a bulletin of which the following is a summary:

1. The continued cropping of soils to grain crops only without any system of rotation or other treatment is telling severely upon the original stock of half decomposed spinnal and regerable matters, and nitrogen. Soils which have produced grain crops exclusively for ten or fifteen years contain from a third to a half less humis and hitrogen than adjoining soils that have never been blowed.

A Soils which have been cropped until the organic matters and humus have been materially decreased retain less water and dry our more rapidly than when there is a large amount of organic matter present in

a Bolls which are rich in humus contain a larger amount of phosphates associated with them in available forms than the soils that are poor in

Soils which are rich in humus and organic matters produce a larger amount of carbon dioxide that acts as a solvent upon the soil particles and also the roots in procuring food.

A One half of a sandy knoll, heavily manured with well-rotted manure, contained pearly a quarter more water during a six weeks' drought than the other half that received no manure.

The supply of organic matter in the soil must be kept up, because it takes such an important part, indirectly, in keeping up the fertility of the soil. A good system of rotation, including sod crops and well-prepared cluding sod crops and well-prepared farm manures, will do this, and will avoid the introduction and use of commercial fertilizers, which are now costing the farmers of the United States over \$85,000,000 annually. It will not do to wait until this question forces it-

do to wait until this question forces itself upon us.

I. A rotation of crops will soon be
necessary on account of the peculiar
composition of some of the soils and
the corresponding sub-soils, especially
those in which the surface soils are
richer in phosphates and nitrogen
while the sub-soils are richer in potash
and lime. By means of rotation, the
rull benefits of the strong points of both
the top soils and the sub-soil will be
secured.

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
