It was not long ago that, when the allotment of \$1,000,000 was made for the equipment of the militia, the event was celebrated as a big step toward the encouragement of the citizen soldiery. This year the appropriation for the betterment of the National Guard will amount to \$5,000,000. Of this sum \$2,000,000 will be used in purchasing elothing and equipment.
