## WASHINGTON LETTER.

From our Regular Correspondent)

Washington, D. C. Jan. 1, 1909.

The familiar play called "The Official New Years Reception" was again enacted at the White House on January 1st, 1910. It could be introduced into the moving picture shows, it would no doubt attract good houses.

At a fixed hour the President and his wife receive first the Diplomatic Corps, consisting of the ambassadors, ministers and attaches from foreign countries. These are quite numerous now, the more important powers being represented by six or seven persons. They all come in the uniforms of their several countries with gold lace and decorations, composing a brilliant regatta that our army and our naval officers cannot attain. The smallest South and Central American republics display an array of gold lace and decoration that outshines the uniforms of the representatives of Germany, Austria and Russia, although those countries are anything but simple in their full dress official clothes.

After the diplomatic corps has wished the President and Mrs. Taft a happy new year and received their greeting in kind, the members of the Cabinet followed by the Justices of the Supreme Court in the dark silk robes in which they sit in court and the Senators and Representatives in Congress or those who happen to be in Washington during the holidays, pass the President and his wife and exchange greetings.

Then come those in the Civil Service, chiefs of bureaus and the officials of the District of Columbia, followed finally by private citizens who have formed a long waiting line.

This scene has been enacted for fully a hundred years, every President of the United States taking part in it. It was Mrs. Cleveland who, in the midst of the reception stated that she wanted to rest a moment and change her smile and many a President and his wife has had a swollen hand and a stiff arm for a week after the ordeal.

Congress will resume its sessions in a few days and it is expected that the political situation will be interesting, for with the determination of the insurgents to make themselves heard and felt and with the imminent break between the Speaker of the House and the President, there is promise of disclosure and matter of much interest in the coming months.

The question of the increased cost of everything that man and woman used internally, externally and externally is being investigated by the venerable Secretary of Agriculture the question is vital and widespread. It is generally conceded that the original producer does not get more for his products than he is entitled to and there is a strong suspicion that the last retailer has succeeded by

means of combination, in reaping an undue profit. The number of green grocers in city, town and village, it is said, is out of all proportion to the population and it is argued that this great and increasing list of those middlemen between the purchaser and the consumer indicate the great extent of rich pickings. Combinations and trusts are under keen suspicion nowadays and the business trust is doubtless the most intolerable of all. It is proposed to organize League to fight the high prices in the necessities of life which have been increasing from year to year and have now reached abnormal rates.

Dr. Schaeff, a well known economist, has suggested the formation of a League similar to an organization formed in Germany years ago for the suppression of the exorbitantly high price of coffee. The members of this League abstained from buying coffee for a time all over the German Empire with the result that the price fell to a normal point, competition was resumed and the trust broken.

A number of distinguished men in Washington, including members of Congress were present when a preliminary organization was effected. A local propaganda is proposed and women as well as men will be enlisted.

The plan of procedure will be that when any article of food is forced too high in price, the members will be notified secretly that on a certain day all will discontinue buying that article. It is believed that this would bring the trusts to terms. It is for instance, several millions of people should discontinue for a week the use of beef, there is no doubt that it would have a very serious effect upon the market. The promoters of the league believe no trust could long survive such

## NEXT COTTON CROP.

This Year's Short Yield May Be Followed by Bumper Planting.

Memphis, Jan. 1.—The 10,000,000 bale cotton crop of 1909 caused talk of want of facilities for production but the 13,000,000 bale crop of the next year broke all records. It is pretty early to talk of next year's crop but it is being done, because of the usual price level and widespread talk of cotton famine.

Generally speaking, it is safe to predict a record acreage, though indications will be placed by the question of labor, spread of the boll weevil, attention to other crops and the matter of seed. This latter question is one that needs consideration, and some of the wise cotton people are not unmindful of the danger likely to be incurred through the high prices now being paid for seed and the scramble for it.

Should there come a spring when planting would have to be done several times—and such seasons are common—seed would be a big factor in fixing acreage.

High cost of grain, meat and other staples have added impetus to the movement for diversified farming, and make less likely a very great increase in acreage.

The Central States are looked to for the greater part of the acreage increase. The Atlantic States have shown small increase for several years.
