## MIDDLE WEST POLITICS

### That Section is Honeycombed With Insurgents Ready to Vote Democratic Ticket.

Are there many insurgent Republicans in the Middle West? The South asked James B. Lloyd, Editor of the Lincoln, Illinois, Daily Courier, who is now here visiting relatives. "Yes, the action of Speaker Cannon in ruling the house with an iron hand, and the failure of Congress to redeem the pledge made prior to the election, by Taft for an honest downward revision of the Tariff, has made the Middle West insurgent territory." In short the Republican voters are in revolt in that section of the country.

In Iowa, Minnesota, Kansas, Nebraska and Indiana the insurgent movement has already gained great headway, due to the hostility to Cannonism and Aldrichism, which stand for control of the government by the big interests. In the event of the defeat of an insurgent Republican Congress for re-nomination by a "stand-patter" it would mean the election of a Democrat. "How about 'Uncle Joe' Cannon in his own District?"

The opposition to Speaker Cannon is confined to no particular section of the country, and recent information which I have received from the Speaker's District is to the effect that he is uneasy about the situation. "One can not have any conception of the hostility toward Speaker Cannon in the Middle West. The newspapers that have hitherto supported him are turning against him. When such leading Republican papers as the Chicago Tribune and the Record Herald join the insurgent faction, their action is full of political significance. The insurgent movement sprang up among the rank and file of the Republican party in the Middle West, and even though an insurgent should become a 'backslider' the voters would simply throw him overboard, and see new leaders, but in most cases they would vote for an honest, clear Democrat in preference to a Cannonite.

A Minister, who resides in Lincoln, told me recently that on a trip through Iowa, Indiana, Kansas, and Nebraska, he failed to find a single Republican who endorsed Cannon or the Tariff bill, and he said they are ready to vote for an honest Democrat in preference to a follower and supporter of Cannon."

What, then, is the most political ice, tariff, trust or what?"

"The excessive rates under the new Payne-Aldrich law, increasing the cost of living, and the grinding greed of the trust are the chief causes for the political revolt, that is now assuming gigantic proportions in the Middle West. The people of that section feel that they have been 'buncoed' on the tariff law, and the trusts have not been checked in their depredations. Keep an eye on the Middle West, and listen out for the results in the November elections."

### A Chance to Make the County Prosper.

Editor Southerner:—As North Carolina is an agricultural State and as it has many acres that can be made much more productive than they are at present, I would like to be instrumental in improving the soil of the Commonwealth in general and Edgecombe in particular.

The State needs desirable immigrants, those who will till the soil and cause the land to enhance in value. There are many parts of our county that could be cut up into small farms and new rural communities established. Being in touch with an Association, the object of which is to attract Jewish farmers throughout the country, either singly or in group I would be pleased to hear from any one in Edgecombe who has land to offer for sale. It is probably not known to the majority of my readers that more than five thousand Jewish farmers are scattered throughout the United States. They have a nation or organization of their own and can show surprising results. The two Jewish Farm Schools, one at Doylestown, Pa., and the other at Woodlawn, N. J., are graduating a class of men who are making their mark in the agricultural world. Both of them have technical departments which put them on par with colleges like the Agricultural and Mechanical College, at Raleigh, and the V.P.I. at Blacksburg, Va. Before placing graduates in a new field, or establishing a colony of Old World farmers who bring with them scientific methods of cultivation, the soil for land in Europe is not identical as it is in the south.

**Where Our Money Goes.**  
If every hundred dollars of property in the United States were made to pay about \$1.70 a year in taxes, the revenue so derived would meet all expenses of government—Federal, State and local. There would be no need of customs duties or of internal revenue taxes to support the Federal government or of the great sums which States and cities raise by license fees, franchise taxes and the like. This statement is based upon the latest figures of governmental disbursements supplied by the statistical bureau of the treasury. According to the same authority, each hundred dollars of property that is directly taxed at all pays \$2.05 a year, and that doesn't half meet the bill. It produces only \$725,000,000 while the governments—Federal, State and local—spend \$1,700,000,000. The farmer or small holder pays his \$2.05 on each hundred, and then has to chip in his share of the additional \$1,000,000,000—made up of customs duties, internal revenue taxes, license fees, which the governments spend. Total cost of running the governments—Federal, State and local—amounts to about \$29 a head a year, or \$100 for a family of five. A totally thrifless person may escape his share and an exceedingly thrifty person may escape his. But we surely can't get a goodly number of reasonably thrifty heads of families pay more than their share. Except as regards the tariff, very little is heard of this subject in politics, and yet it is obviously a big subject. Said an experienced member of an Illinois taking body the other day, "Under the laws now on our statute books it is absolutely impossible to make an equitable assessment"—Saturday Evening Post.

## IT'S THE EASIEST WAY.

### Insurgents Have Not Energy And Courage to Oppose Bosses.

The easiest way in action and thinking lays many a snare for us. The easiest way not only helps us deceive ourselves, but also to misjudge others. Take the case of the "insurgents" in Congress, for example. The are few in number and control none of the sources of influence. The "regulars," however, are numerous and have patronage and advantage without stint. The temptation is to judge the few "insurgents" as chronic kickers, as so-called men.

"How could it be that the vast majority endorse Cannon if he is so unpalatable?" we are tempted to ask. "If there was anything goodly, wrong would they not rebel, too?"

Most men prefer "the easiest way." You must remember, and just now the easiest Congressional way is to fall in line with Boss Cannon. It is more pleasant. It yields a man more emoluments. It decks him out with those achievements which mark a successful Congressional career. Besides, insurrection holds out no promise of success. Cannon is strongly entrenched. The massed power of money stands behind his throne—money, whose power reaches into every Congressional district in the nation. Therefore, to be "regular" is the easiest way.

It takes considerable courage to be an "insurgent" under these circumstances, and until the insurrection become popular it will not command a majority. If Boss Cannon give signs of slipping off his throne and if the people were hot for his downfall, do you doubt there would be an insurrection? Insurrection, however, is a very unpalatable thing to try to fight against. The insurgent who would dare to attempt it, it means the loss of position. I mean the loss of having one's name mentioned with honor as a failure in public life. It means being forever proscribed from "bearing the goods." It means opposing the President of the United States and the attitudes of the money power. It means putting oneself outside the pale of Congressional custom. Does it take courage to be an insurgent? Is the majority of "regulars" any proof that the "insurgents" are wrong?—From the Detroit News.

**Think Kindly of the Microbe.**  
Despite not the humble bacterium. Consider its ways as revealed by science and understand that, as there are good and bad men, so, too, are there are good bacteria as well as bad ones.
