April Weather Summary

April averaged cool with well distributed rains. Although averaging cool, there were a number of short, mild periods but no outstanding warm or cold spells. The snowfall was heavy in higher mountain region on 1st and 6th. On Mount Mitchell snow remained on the ground of 3 to 43 inches through February, March and until the 23rd of April.

Rather cool weather and well distributed precipition resulted in a gradual and good to excellent advance of rye, wheat, oats, clover, pastures, potatoes, hardy truck and fruit. Forests show luxuriant growth over large areas and the season to date has been very favorable also for lawns and flower gardens, but temperature was mostly too low for a satisfactory start of tender truck and cotton. Progress of the latter crops has been slow with planting delayed one to two weeks.
