Saluda Hospital Opens

SALUDA, May 29.—Dr. D. L. Smith's Infants' and Children's Santarium opens here Monday June 1. Preparations for the opening began with a visit by Dr. Smith and are being continued by the superintendent, Mrs. Florria A. Carmeron. Mrs. Cameron reports that there is no other hospital of its kind. It attempts to provide a homelike atmosphere for parents and children. It provides cottages for the use of parents, and besides the 65 beds for children there are double beds for parents in the rooms with the children. There are in all 15 buildings. Children up to 12 years old are admitted to the sanitarium. The hospital has had patronage from all over the United States, Cuba, Central and South America.—Asbeville Citizen

## Fla. Gov. Kills Race Bill
