President Roosevelt addressed the joint session of the Senate and House of Representatives today noon and reviewed the progress made since his administration which included a restoration of confidence, elimination of child labor, better conditions in agriculture, industry and business. He said that we were facing a new order of change and that if there were anyone to hinder the progress that is being made let him take heed to assume responsibility for it. This nation is a convalescent that not only wants a cure for our diseases but a removal of the causes. Inequalities must be wiped out; the overprivileged must be weeded out and the underprivileged uplifted. No one wants to eliminate the profit motive and destroy ambition, but excessive profits. The security of people must come first, a better livelihood, old age, sickness and unemployment insurance and decent homes to live in. It will take many years to do this, he said. Work must be found for all able-bodied, destitute people, and direct relief which destroys one's self-respect, courage and determinations must stop, and let the local communities
