Annual Meeting, Holy Cross Ch.

Dr. Earle Grady, Mr. F. W. Crandall, and Mr. J. C. Kimberly were elected vestrymen to succeed Mr. Julian Calhoun, Mr. Samuel A. Bingham and Mr. Harold Crandall at the annual parish meeting of the Holy Cross church held Monday evening. There are nine vestrymen of the parish, three retiring each year. When the new vestry met to organize Dr. Grady was appointed senior warden and Mr. Crandall junior warden. Mr. F. P. Bacon was re-elected as treasurer of the parish and Mr. William C. Burnett re-elected clerk of the vestry. The treasurer's report showed all bills paid and a small balance in the treasury with which to begin a new year. Encouraging reports were also received from the Woman's Auxiliary, St. Agnes Guild, and the Sunday school.

Country Club Elects Officers

At the annual meeting of the Tryon Country club held at Oak Hall hotel on the evening of January 14th, 1935, the following directors were elected: Nelson Jackson, Jr., B. L. Ballenger, K. A. Bowen, J. C. Kimberly, M. A. Richards, F. P. Bacon, Julian Calhoun.

The officers elected for the year 1935, are: M. A. Richards, president; B. L. Ballenger, vice-president; K. A. Bowen, secretary-treasurer.

The refinancing of the outstanding 6% coupon bonds, accompanied during the fall of 1934, was reviewed and approved.

The Country club had an issue of \$12,500 in bonds which fell due in 1934. With the unanimous consent of the bond holders, a new issue of 5%, twenty year coupon bonds, callable in whole or in part at any interest date, was exchanged for the old bonds of like amount.

The Tryon Country club starts out the year 1935 with no obligations, except this funded debt, with all current bills paid, and money in the bank. The receipts of the club during 1934 were larger than any year since 1931, and the prospects for the club's activities during 1935 are very promising.
