E. B. Cloud Introduces Absentee Ballot Law

Raleigh, Jan. 16.—Represen fative E. B. Cloud, of Polk, who was denied the Democratic nomination because the state board of elections charged illegal use of the absentee ballot, has introduced a bill in the House to repeal the absentee ballot law for Polk county.

His bill, referred to the committee on elections and election laws, headed by Sparger, of Stokes county, would prohibit the use of absentee ballots in both primary and general elections in Polk county.—Asheville Citizen.
